

Diamond Jubilee is recognised in trees thanks to the Bridport Lions

In spite of the continuous rain and wind on the morning of March 4th, many willing volunteers turned out to transform a 1200 square

metre site at the top of Park Road into a wooded meadow for residents and wildlife alike.

Twenty five are now settling into our own "Jubilee Green" as it will be known and a plaque will be erected to mark the occasion of Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee 2012. The site will be managed by the Town Council and the Community Orchard group

The trees were funded by Bridport Lions Club, except for the oak which was grown from an acorn by a friend of Councillor Geoffrey Ackerman who can be seen with the Lions President Don Morley, Councillors Martin and Maggie Ray, Jill Lloyd Chair of the Bridport Community Orchard Group and Andy Jeffries who is their volunteer co-ordinator and committee member. The oak is part of a national initiative to plant 'Jubilee English Oaks' this year and the remaining tree species were chosen for their blossom, fruit, appearance and attractiveness to wildlife.

Thanks are also due to Councillor Gill Massey, Sheila, Tricia and David Hawkins, Nick Gray, Louis Finnis, Paul Arthur and representatives from The Allington Hill Billies, Transition Town Bridport, Dorset Wildlife Trust and local residents, two of whom now live in London but turned up for the planting!

2 Lions Clubs joined joined forces to create with the co-operation of Manor Farm Country Park a small apple orchard of historic species of fruit trees to mark the occasion of our

sovereign's Diamond Jubilee. On Wednesday 21st of March at Manor Farm starting at 10:00am members of both clubs with the assistance of staff and volunteers from Manor Farm planted 17 trees.

Andrew Davies the Park Manager added:" We are very pleased to support this initiative led by the Lions. Keen to promote the cultivation of heritage varieties of fruit trees, we are looking forward to the trees flourishing and in the coming years producing a bountiful harvest of apples."

Lions mark jubilee with trees

3 Trees have been planted by Goring, Woodcote & District Lions Club in three local villages to mark the Queen's diamond jubilee.

Having consulted Parish

councils the Lions have planted a whitebeam sorbus aria lutescen on the village green by St John's Church at Whitchurch Hill, on the Gardiner Recreation Ground in Goring, and on Woodcote village green by the war memorial.

Lion President Chris Bergmann said, "The Club believe this a good way to celebrate this diamond jubilee year and show our loyalty to the Queen. The trees will not only mark this joyous occasion but will also serve as a thanks to our families, friends, neighbours and everyone in the community who has supported us in helping other people in need.

These whitebeam trees were chosen in consultation with the local parish councils for their attractive white blossom in spring and red berries in autumn, that also represent the red and white colours of the St. George's flag. The trees are good for wildlife, suitable for planting in public areas, and also suited to the chalky soil of the Chilterns."

Lions Club of Crofton plant 120 Trees

Assisted by young pupils at Baycroft School we have now planted sixty saplings of Hazel, Holly, Mountain Ash and Silver Birch trees that will eventually form a colourful screen at the front of the Sensory Garden at the school. A second batch of sixty have also been planted at Seafield Park which was originally a Naval Officer Training Establishment. Appropriately we were assisted by ten local members of the Sea Cadet Unit "T.S. Tormentor".

Lion President Peter Bacon receives a cheque from the Alton Runners, Men's Captain, Guy Henshaw, for £2000 recognising the effort the Lions Club of Alton contributes to the success of

the Alton 10 Road Race and the Downland Challenge 10K & 5K fun runs each year. This donation forms an important element of the funds that are used to support local charities and the community services, community projects and individual support provided each year by Alton Lions.

Every year Alton Lions, together with Alton Runners, organise the Alton 10, a ten-mile road race in May and, at the start of the cross-country season in October, and the Downland Challenge 10k & 5k races.

The Alton 10 is part of the Hampshire Road Race League competition and draws a large entry from all over the county as well as many other runners from the south of England and entries typically exceed 600 runners.

The Downland Challenge 10k cross-country race is combined with a 5k route for younger runners and local schools help promote it in order to encourage young people to keep fit and there is a cup for the school with the most successful entry.

Runners pay a fee to enter the races and after expenses have been deducted the surplus is donated to the Lions Club of Alton who provide the race administration, course supervisors and marshals for each race.



A very special Hospital chair

The Royal Berkshire Hospital has been presented with a very special chair in memory of Ray Ballanger a former member of the local Lions Club.

This special electrically operated recliner chair costing £1,550 was given to the Emmer Green Ward at the RBH in Reading to help improve mobility of elderly patients as an aid to their recovery. Ray Ballanger died from pancreatitis aged 82 in December 2010 at the hospital.

The chair was funded jointly by the Lions Clubs of Pangbourne, Theale & District and Goring, Woodcote & District who each contributed £500, with the remainder having been donated at Ray's funeral.

Ray Ballanger, from Woodcote, joined the Lions in 1974

as a member of South Chiltern Lions Club which is now named Pangbourne, Theale & Disrict. He transferred to the Goring, Woodcote & District Lions Club in 2005.

For many years Ray worked in Reading with the Prudential Assurance Company and was a former training officer at Reading Technical College. He was also co-editor of the Woodcote Magazine, the forerunner to the Woodcote Correspondent.

Attending the presentation with representatives of both Lions Clubs were his widow Mary and his son John. Mary said "He was a good husband and did many things to help others in need".

Overall the Fishing Festival raised £2,268 and with the Lions Raffle adding another £173, we totalled £2,441 for the day. This was the 38th fishing festival event and since the Lions have been involved, we have raised over £30,000 for Naomi House, the Winchester based hospice. Many thanks to all the fishermen who rose early from their beds to support us again this year.

New Chiltern Way Kissing Gates



A total of three "Kissing Gates" funded by Goring, Woodcote & District Lions Club from their Charity Funds have replaced old and difficult to climb over stiles along the Chiltern Way in late March. All three gates, costing £ 633 in total, were installed following consultation with local landowners by a group of volunteer members of the Chiltern Society, Rights of Way Group.

Being both a member of the Chiltern Society and the Lions Club, Mr Martin Lisk said "These new kissing gates replace old styles making it easier for people walking with disabilities to enjoy this beautiful countryside. It is an example of a Lions Club project to improve the environment and being of help to people in our local community at the same time".

The three gates donated by Goring, Woodcote and District Lions Club, are positioned along a local section of the Chiltern Way between Rushmore Lane in Woodcote and Bottom Lane in Checkendon, near Dean Wood.

Shown in the attached photograph are from left to right, Lions member Martin Lisk, then Bob Parry, Charles Crawcour, Barry Cowlard, Tim Dowling & John Lynch who are all volunteer members of the South Chiltern Path Maintenance Volunteers, and Lions member Jon Solman. The volunteers operate under the auspices of the Chiltern Society and meet three mornings a month. Originally their main task was to clear overgrown public footpaths and bridleways, but recently a primary activity has been to replace stiles with gates (usually kissing gates) to make public paths more accessible to a broad range of users. This work is carried out in agreement with Oxfordshire County Council and the local landowners. One of the group (on this occasion Bob Parry) plans and directs the tasks for the day.
