Meon Valley Lions club has supported the Wickham Charity Beer Festival for a number of years, providing a hot food BBQ service for the hundreds of real ale aficionados. The latest autumn festival was the 11th and as well as being a brilliant community event, yet again raised heaps of cash for local causes and charities.



Our two barbeques were in constant action from 6.26pm when the first burger hit the plate, through to 10.30pm when we finally sold out of everything. It was a record night for this event in terms of food sales, raising £826 for our charity fund.

This year for the first time, the organisers asked us to also provide a team to operate the evening shift on the bar, ensuring a steady stream of over thirty real ales and ciders to the thirsty punters. This put our resources to the test, but thanks to a great response from volunteer spouses, families and friends we coped admirably. In all we had well over thirty people deployed in some role or other during the course of the evening. Quite an achievement for one club.

We're pleased to announce that this effort raised a further £2,000 for the Lions - monies that will be channelled specifically to maintaining and running our new Lions' minibus. Our bus was part-funded through the generosity of the Wickham Co-operative community card scheme and is regularly seen in and around Wickham providing essential transport for local clubs, charities and groups.

FOLLOW YOUR DREAM – BRACKNELL STYLE

Bracknell Lions Club celebrates 45 years of existence in November but very nearly did not achieve this milestone had it not made a significant decision this time last year.



In 2006, three of the remaining four club members decided to call it a day at the end of the year as they were getting older and could not manage to carry out fundraising or service activities any longer – the

average age of the club was 84! PDG Godwin Micallef asked me to go in and try to turn the club around as Rebuilding Lion as I actually lived in Bracknell although I was a member of Wokingham club having recently transferred from District 105A. Changes were initiated in the club by moving the existing meeting place to a more central location, having just one meeting a month instead of two and by encouraging the introduction of lady members – a move which the previous members had not whole-heartedly embraced before this. Over the next 5 years the club did grow by word of mouth and recommendation targeted at family, friends, fellow church-goers, and PTA committees – at its peak in that era there were 13 members however through no fault of our own the club started to decline in numbers again due to members getting married and moving away, relocation due to job changes and of course, all too familiar now, the passage to higher service. And then there were five members left again.

The club soldiered on as best it could but with minimal activity taking place it looked like 2006 all over again and at a club meeting in November 2012, the club agreed that if we could not get two more members by the end of May 2013, we would fold as a club and return our charter. I was tasked with organising one final membership drive with the budget of all our admin account and a grant from our District Membership Fund for ailing clubs. Everything was planned meticulously – the area to be targeted, the content of the invitation 'package', the venue for the open meeting, the timing and most of all the support of all the nine other clubs in the Region to help distribute just over 2000 'invitations' through the letterboxes of the target area. The 'package' was nothing new, it was re-using best practice used by another club in the Region but looked a 'professional' package; the area targeted was a well-established estate in Bracknell with its own Community Centre (the venue for the open meeting) in the heart of it next to a superstore. The weekend chosen was the weekend of the Marie Curie Daffodil appeal where the remaining club Lions would be at the entrance to the store with collecting tins. We also got the permission from the local Marie Curie organiser (and the store) to give out the Lions leaflets so everyone who got a daffodil, got a leaflet from us as well.

The Open Evening was planned for two weeks later on a Monday evening from 20.00 to 21.00. All five club members were in attendance to meet and greet and everybody was given a name badge and offered tea or coffee. They were also requested to enter their details of name, address, contact telephone and email onto a sign-up sheet. We used the club display boards in the hall for the attendees to browse Lions projects and had a good selection of our own

MD105 Lions pamphlets and old copies of The Lion. Twenty six attended this meeting which consisted of showing the Lions Story DVD, a fifteen talk on the history of the Bracknell club – its activity and how it operated – followed by 30 minutes open forum for questions. We were extremely fortunate that our local paper had given us a front page article on the membership drive and the open evening and linked it on their Twitter and Facebook pages which is how the majority of the youngsters who attended got to hear about it. The evening ended with an event to attend our business meeting two weeks later which we scheduled to take place at the same venue.

To our surprise 16 people turned up at the April business meeting having been reminded a few days earlier by email from me enclosing a copy of the proposed agenda. We needed to make decisions fast – we needed a new meeting venue as we had previously been meeting in someone's house, we also needed to arrange a social event so that we could meet informally between meetings and get to know each other and finally a short monthly 'newsletter' detailing activity and future events. Fortunately we had two fundraising events in the calendar over that period and the potential members helped out at those events.

And so in June we inducted the first two new members, followed in July by another four, in August one more and then the last of the current group at our October meeting at which we also had a new prospective who had been a Lion in the old Rhodesia 40 years ago but is still very active and wants to get involved again.

And so we have grown between June and October from five to thirteen – a 160% growth rate and far beyond my wildest dreams. We also still have eight people on my list of original names who have not yet attended a meeting or activity and who I hope to slowly reel in by sending them regular reminders of our meetings and future events. We ended up after the drive with just £6.75 in our admin account but if we had folded that money would have been shared anyway or donated to charity so the event was an excellent return on investment. This Christmas we will be doing Santa activities as we have acquired a sleigh but more importantly the manpower to be able to use it effectively to raise funds for helping others; I am now dreaming of trying to reach at least 15 members by the end of this Lions year or maybe even 20 members – if you don't dream you have no focus to achieve

Finally again I would like to place on record my thanks to all the clubs in Region 5 of District 105D. All too often we hear and see 'Lions lose Lions' – in this case it was 'Lions getting Lions'. Lion Mike Hendy

Youth floored by Lions



Goring and District Youth Club has just had a new carpet fitted on the floor of their games room thanks to a donation of £400 from the local Lions

Club of Goring, Woodcote & District. The balance of costs involved were provided by the Gatehampton Trust Fund.

The photograph attached shows just some of the teenagers who regularly attend the club with Lion president Alan Lovegrove (on the left) and Mike Cornfield, Chairman of the Goring Youth Club Management Committee (on the right of the picture). Many of the young ones shown are now 18 and have been members of the Youth Club since they were 11 years old.

Each Wednesday evening the Youth Club is open and used by up to 20 youngsters each time who pay an annual subscription of £5 and a further £1 as they sign in at the door. They have use of very nicely furnished rooms in the Community Centre with a kitchen and a games room equipped with pool table, table football, an amplifier/speaker system on which to play their music and a laptop PC with free wi-fi facilities.

Since the withdrawal of financial support from the County and Local council the Youth Club is run just by seven adult volunteers, but still costs up to £3,000 a year to keep going

The Lions Club of Bournemouth & PCaSO (Prostate Cancer Support Organisation) Event - a rewarding service in numerous ways.



Following articles in the Lions Magazine, and talking with Clubs across the country who have undertaken this particular type of Event, The Lions Club of Bournemouth decided to liaise with the East Dorset Branch of PCaSO (Prostate Cancer Support Organisation) to combine in delivering an "Awareness campaign" which offered Free Prostate Cancer Testing.

We spoke with our local Football Championship League Club who generously offered their facilities, free of charge, to put on the Event at the Goldsands Football Stadium in Dean Park, Bournemouth on the 18th & 19th October 2013.

With a wide campaign of media coverage to publicise the event, using local press and radio contacts, and then e-mailing networks to numerous Organisations, Clubs, Churches and Sports facilities, we found that the available appointments were very quickly filled. In fact, a list has been formed for future testing.

The eminent Consultant Urologist, David Baxter-Smith, provided very informative presentations as well as speaking informally to many men about their concerns or questions.

The entire Event took a lot of organisation and demonstrated again how well Lions can "operate" to **serve their Community.**

Along with the support of the Mayor and Mayoress of Bournemouth and the Leader of Bournemouth Council and other dignitaries (some of whom were tested) we also had great support from Lions – from our area and further afield. Our Regional Chairman, Zone Chairman, Presidents from our Zone Clubs and other members gave of their time to come along and support this cause.

PCaSO had four teams of trained testers over the 2 days, who completed the testing of 185 men. The testers use Bio-Scan equipment which can give a result in approx. 15 minutes.

The test was offered to men of 45 years and upwards; the majority attending were in the lower to mid age range. All results are graded into Green, Amber and Red.

Of the 185 men tested the results were very positive.

- 169 Green – good, no action needed
- 6 Amber - which recommended a follow up test in 3/6 months.
- 10 Red - which indicates that further investigation is needed and the persons are counselled and immediately advised go to see their GPs.

We believe there are four key successes to this event:

Prostate Cancer Awareness is now "on the map" in our Community.

Lions have gained a feeling of usefulness and worth in organising and delivering this stage of our project, whilst our Community has recognised what Lions can do!

Bournemouth Lions are ready to share their experience and encourage and assist other Lions Clubs who wish to offer this Service to their communities.

We have found that a partnership with another Organisation, like PCaSO, enables us to assist both Organisations to meet the needs of their Community.
