

me or 1st Vice DG Lion David Taylor know so that it can be listed in the 2016-2017 District Diary.

I have visited several more Clubs this month and was asked to badge a new member into the Gosport and Lee-on-Solent club. This was a privilege as this is the first new member I have inducted as District Governor. This brings me on to the fact that we are bringing new members into the medium and larger Clubs, but the small clubs are struggling to find prospective members.

The District has so far this year inducted 36 new members, but again we have lost 23. Some losses are inevitable but in many cases it's worth offering Privileged Membership or At Large status if it's a case of age or business/family commitments.

At present we have a total membership of 1,240, just ten away from that magic figure of 1,250 to take us out of transition. I know that if we don't lose any members in the next month, we will achieve Regular Status once again as I have been reliably informed that at least ten will be badged up during this period.

With regard to the smaller Clubs, I am aware that it will take a massive effort on their part to turn the tide, but it can be done as some Clubs who were down to single figures over the past three to five years have recovered, but it does need determination to do it. The GMT is there to help and will help when and where required and providing your Admin account isn't bulging at the seams, the GMT can assist financially as well as physically.

On a much more cheerful note!

On the morning of Saturday 19 September Anne and I visited the Bournemouth Lions Club's Health Awareness and Wellbeing event at the Bournemouth School for Girls. We were not sure what to expect but were pleasantly surprised with the professionalism of how the event was organised and the number of different stands that were displaying their projects and services. These ranged from medical consultants giving talks and presentations, pop in or pre-book diabetes, blood pressure, cholesterol, heart and spinal checks and prostate cancer screening, alternative therapies, cookery demos and advice on healthy eating, physical exercise demos, fun and games for all ages. This was an eye-opener as to what a Club can do when it puts its mind to it. The event was free entry and self-funding due to the supreme efforts of a couple of dedicated Lions with the full support of their Club. All in all it was a superb community event which was well supported. This is an event that I would recommend to other like minded Clubs.

A Special Appeal for support for homeless, sight impaired and limbless service personnel

In the new edition of the LION magazine there is an article highlighting the approved Special Appeal for Blind Veterans UK and Blesma - the Limbless Veteran Association to expand its rehabilitation facilities at the Blind Veterans UK Llandudno Centre.

Clubs are asked to consider, if they have not already done so, making a donation to this Appeal. This is to complete the building and refurbishment which will then be used to provide specific rehabilitation training for the current and ex-service personnel facing homelessness as a result of their lives being immeasurably altered, indeed shattered, while they were protecting the nation's safety. Show appreciation for their sacrifice by fulfilling the goal of raising the target amount of £100,000 so that Lions Clubs of the British Isles and Ireland can continue to be permanently associated with a major state-of-the-art rehabilitation centre, providing essential services for disabled current and ex-service men and women.

At the launch of the Centennial Projects at this year's Multiple District Convention, Lion Phil Nathan asked Lions Clubs to support this major Council-approved Appeal as a joint acknowledgement of Blind Veterans UK's Centenary in 2015 and Lions Clubs International's own Centenary in 2017.

As a further acknowledgement of Lions Clubs' support, it is intended to name the linking glass Entrance Foyer and Central Communal area in honour of Lions Clubs International and two day rooms in the Centre in honour of Lions Melvin Jones and Bert Mason.

A Feast of Fine Food

Meon Valley Lions Club were once again delighted to support the Taste of Wickham Festival on Sunday 13 September. Now in its second year, this food festival has already built a Hampshire-wide reputation, with 60 stalls show-casing the very best in local food, drink and produce

The Lions were there from 9.00 am on the Sunday morning, setting up our barbeque for what was to be a frantic few hours, keeping pace with demand from the five thousand hungry visitors who turned up on the day – an increase of over a thousand on the previous year's turnout. Our two barbeques ran nonstop for about five hours, during which time our 13 strong catering team of chefs, food preps, runners and servers managed to dish-up 724 individual servings. That's a running average of over two burger or sausage servings every minute. It was a combination of good fortune and smart thinking by the organisers that the Bowman Ales stall was located close by, facilitating much needed sustenance to the hard working Lions' staff!

Our grateful thanks go to Tull's, the Wickham butcher, for providing all the choice meats for this event and particularly Ben Sawyers for letting us take over his cold store and for accommodating all our demands. Also, we acknowledge the support of our other suppliers, McCarthy's Super Stall and Tesco's (Fareham) for providing the onions and bread products respectively.

At the end of the day we expect to clear around £1,400 for our charity account – moneys that will be ploughed back into community programmes in Wickham and other Meon Valley villages. Two other people also deserve mention. Lions John Ormiston and Michael White spent the day sharing driving duties in the Lions' minibus, providing a free park and ride service to the many visitors needing to get from the outlying parking areas to Wickham square.





GMS Summer time and have we been busy!

What a summer it has been for GMS Lions! Firstly I, the web/media bloke, have moved to Lille in France with my job, and in the few months I have been away so much has happened. So sorry for the delay in getting the news to you.

The summer began with our new President Lion Denise Stenner taking the baton from Lion Helen Littell. A huge thank you to Helen for all that she did over the past year and welcome to Denise who has come back for her third time as Club President. She brings a lot of experience and a seemingly insatiable will and sense of fun.

Roll back the clock then to a July sunny day in Shaftesbury and GMS Lions helped out the Rotary Club with their annual Gold Hill Fair. The atmosphere was terrific and the fair was awash with people enjoying themselves. There was a wonderful programme of music, folk dancing and much merriment was had.

On 15 July GMS Lions hosted an extremely informative event at Shaftesbury Abbey site and gardens which was extremely well received by all who attended. Did you know the former Shaftesbury Abbey was founded in 888 by King Alfred? King Canute died here in 1035 and in more recent times Ridley Scott's used Gold Hill (adjacent to the abbey site) as the setting for his Hovis television advertisement.

Shortly after this we were advised that Gillingham Town Council could no longer provide us with a storage capability due to restructuring. Thank you to them for their support over the years but an even bigger thank you to Johnsons in Station Yard, Gillingham. They have already helped out in previous years by allowing us to park our Christmas float in their yard. They have offered us a large wooden container to store things in. This really is fantastic news.

GMS Lion David Taylor has previously highlighted the plight of Zest Cafe in Sherborne, a community wellbeing centre for people with mental health. In July he teamed up with Blackmore Vale Lions to fund a much needed new printer for the café.

The Club has continued its association with Hippbones Youth Club, which has now been running for nine years providing a much needed outlet to local youth in Gillingham fortnightly on a Saturday morning. Specifically GMS Lions have partnered its Youth Leadership Training Scheme with their Hippbones Youth Club Youth Development Trainee Scheme (YDT) which provides an opportunity for teenagers,

aged 14 plus, to gain invaluable life skills and experience and gain invaluable training and accreditation. Go and check it out.

Next in what turned out to be atrocious conditions the GMS Lions were out in force stewarding at the Gillingham & Shaftesbury Show cattle lines. It was

not too wet however to prevent a previous GMS Lions President and current District Lions Vice President from indulging in a steak bap which he rated 9/10, a strawberries and cream pancake which he rated as 8/10 and an ice cream which he rated as 8/10. As for the general public wow they got 10 out of 10.

Towards the end of August the Club was approached by a local carer group for families of mentally ill people, and we were pleased to be able to give a donation of £150 towards this worthy cause.

Right now as I write this the GMS Lions are preparing for their Annual Charter Anniversary and planning a date to get together to refurbish the Christmas float, a date for painting the Christmas float, planning a fund raising quiz for Friday 23 October and looking for volunteers to help marshal the Shaftesbury Gold Hill 10k Run on Sunday 11 October.

I think there is someone out there in the environs of Gillingham, Mere and Shaftesbury who would make an excellent Lion. So if it is you, go along to one of the meetings at 1930 on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at the Town Hall in Gillingham.

Go on surprise yourself.




