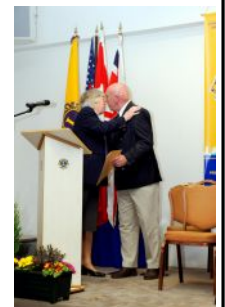
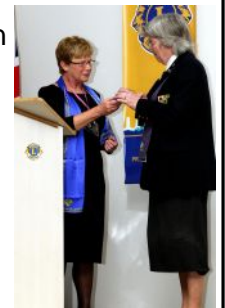

Course for Road Closures

Many Lions throughout 105D are involved on a regular basis with events requiring road closures. It is becoming increasingly common for Police Forces to be unable to provide staffing for such occasions or require payment for providing officers. It can also be expensive to hire trained staff from other organisations.

Now there is the opportunity for Lions Clubs within 105D to arrange for some of their members to be trained for such events. The course lasts 1 day and the current cost is around £60. It is not necessary for every member to be trained, 2 or 3 per Club will suffice as the requirement is for 1 trained person at an event. Once trained, there is a need for an individual to be reassessed every 3 years as for example, with the Food Hygiene Certificates. Although refresher courses or regular involvement with such events will help keep the individual up to date with requirements and expectations.

It is necessary for the Club to ensure that when assisting at an event where they, or another organisation, have applied for road closures, the application includes reference to someone trained with 'Chapter 8 Authority'. This will assist with the application and is likely to meet the requirements of the local Safety Advisory Group. This course fits well alongside the Steward Safety Training, which many Clubs are now undertaking.

It is now 11 years since the First SNAP Disco was held in Fleet. This event attracts 11~16 year olds from the local area.

The event is organised by Fleet Lions in conjunction with Hampshire Police as the partner for Crime stoppers , local council and Youth Services. A great team delivering excellent monthly events.

During these 11 years SNAP has attracted up to 650 youngsters at each event .So why do we put on monthly Discos? The event offers the Police the opportunity to develop relationships with the Youngsters whilst the Youth service can offer support and subtle lifestyle education from Drugs awareness and alcohol abuse for example. All profits are then recycled back in to Youth Projects locally and helping those young people in need.

The events are fun. Lively and noisy. There have been many visiting bands, whether they be on the way up or the way down, also local singers have had the opportunity to showcase their talents and youngsters are given the chance to learn to dance, street style!

Over the years the organisation has changed to meet the ever changing needs of the community and of course to the available voluntary support. A few years ago a partnership was formed clearly outlining duties and responsibilities, HYP was born (Hart Youth Partnerships) and for a time enjoyed the pleasure of help from local club Hart Lions and also Yateley Lions.

The youngsters' needs are much different than those of the baby boomers and we have to monitor needs. A few years ago the numbers were declining, and we couldn't understand the reason.

Then we learned that SNAP wasn't cool! So we listened and learned and adapted our event to become cool and with great efforts from the HYP team SNAP became HYPE and now its really cool. Now we regularly see 450-650 again attending. Our District Treasure Linda remains a very involved member of the HYP team and is also Web mistress as well! The responses to the www.hypefleet.co.uk web site from the youngsters of the area are wonderful and make all the effort worthwhile. We have developed networking sites and schools computer systems to market and promote the events These are interactive and now we have a quality brand. The new event is attracting young parents to join in as volunteers with the possibility of joining Lions.

What do Lions get out of this we ask? We hear all the time Children are our future, they are also a core of the community. Schools and parents are a dominant force in the community and frankly HYPE

events enable us to build great relationships and awareness along with building good relationships with the local councillors, police, youth service and schools. Youngsters are very supportive of Lions in our town....who are Rotary?
