January has been a relatively quiet month with club visits mixed with meetings of various District and Zone Committees. I did get home to Ireland to see my family for a couple of days at the beginning of the month before joining Mike at the VDG Training weekend in Solihull. By the time you read this newsletter I will also have attended, with 1st VDG Ron, the third Council of Governors Meeting in Solihull. For me I think the highlight of the month was attending a very informal but very productive half day brainstorming session held one Saturday morning in the home of 2<sup>nd</sup> VDG Roger and wife Christine. The group was primarily the members of the District Long Range Planning Committee augmented by others with special skills or knowledge in certain topics. We split into three groups and looked at:

- Lions Identity and projects
- Managing the district
- Extended use of IT

Smaller groups have now been established to take these matters forward in more detail and will form part of a three year plan supported by the DG Team to make changes in the way that the District is run and also importantly save money in the cost of District Administration.

My heartfelt thanks to Roger and Christine for their hospitality and for feeding us and also for coming up with this innovative but fun filled way of looking at the future of the District.



**Membership** After all the fine work on membership in November when we actually gained more members than we lost, the position reversed in December – one of the traditional clear out months. We gained 6 new members (plus 2 reinstatements) but lost 18 – some of them I recognise as being long standing members of this Association. These were the categories filled in on the membership report for the drops:

Resigned in good standing—9, Moved—2,Deceased2 Non attendance—2, Non payment of dues—1

Transferred-1, Other - 1.

Exactly 50% of the drops were the ubiquitous "Resigned in Good Standing" which hides a multitude of sins. Have we looked at the real reasons why we lost those members? Did we do anything to stop them? At Convention you will see a presentation on the "Ideal Club" which will be our principal tool as we move forward to try to arrest the decline before the people finally resign by which time it is too late. Whilst I did submit ambitious targets for membership growth at the start of the year, I will be more than happy if at the end of my year I have zero growth or maybe plus 1 or 2 rather than a minus figure. This will mean that I will hand over to the 1st VDG with no overall loss of members for the year. Half way through, we are minus five members from where we started on July 1st when I took over from IPDG Judith - lets all work together to redress that balance by June 30<sup>th</sup>.



# Sun helps Lions Run



The 26<sup>th</sup> Annual 10k Charity Road Run organised by Goring, Woodcote & District Lions Club was officially started in Woodcote by Sir John Robert Madejski OBE DL and

successfully completed in brilliant sunshine on Sunday morning 9<sup>th</sup> January 2011. Although the Lions had been out early to spread salt and grit on many parts of the route which were shaded, the overnight frost had still left some icy patches. Despite there being no wind the course was slow and so the record finish time of 30:31 still stands.





First over the finish line was Chris Green from Reading timed at 35:13.61 followed by Charlie Pearson from London, who was second over the line and timed at 35:26.86. The first female was 9<sup>th</sup> over the line, Samantha Amend from Marlow, timed at 38:36.48. When Samantha won the 2009 Ladies Trophy in this run she was18th over the line with a finish time of 41:06.83

The UK Athletic Association provided a team of referees who helped assure the Lions of their continued good organisation, preparation and administration of this annual event.

All finishers received a medal. The winners Cups and Trophies were presented by Sir John Madejski as shown in the attached table of results and photographs.

Volunteers from a number of several other local clubs and organisations helped the Lions maintain the enjoyment, safety and efficacy of this annual event. They include Scouts & Guides, Rotary and 41 Clubs, and all are much appreciated. A team from St John Ambulance provided first aid cover, but thankfully no injuries were reported.

Ten local businesses made generous contributions. Warmingham – Estate Agents were the major sponsor, others include The Henley Standard, Halarose Ltd – Woodcote, JRS Services – Woodcote, Wooodborough House Dental Practice – Pangbourne, Caversham Heath Golf Club, Bouchier Fencing Co - Woodcote, Sol-Tec Ltd – Reading, Johnson Matthey - Sonning Common and the Boathouse Dental Surgery – Goring.

The proceeds and sponsorship monies from this event

are still being received, but are estimated to exceed £3,000 and will be split between the local area Macmillan Cancer Support and the Air Ambulance (Berks/Oxon/Bucks).



His widow, Mary, and family generously decided



#### POINTS FOR VISITS?

When you read your Lion Magazine do you ever look at the Visiting Lion competition league table? It is on page 48 of the December/January edition. Do you ever wonder why no clubs from 105D appear in this?

Quite simply very few clubs in 105D ever enter either the MD or the District competition and as the new 105D Competitions Officer, (taking office from January 2011), I would like to see this changed. It was not always the case and a few years ago Maidenhead won, not only the 105D competition, but the MD Competition as well!

The rules for the MD Competition differ slightly from our own competition and can be found on the MD105 Website under members, competitions and finally Travelling Lion. The rules for our own competition have been circulated along with a letter and forms in the January District Mailing. These are also on the District web site. I would urge you all to look at the rules and see if your club can enter. You will see that if you enter the 105D competition you will automatically be entered into the MD competition as I will forward all forms to MDHQ provided they are received in time.

Why bother to enter? The words engraved on the 105D shield are to "unite the Clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding". The 105D competition was introduced by PDG Barrie Richardson and the shield is presented annually at District Convention. Inter-club visits (both social and business meetings) are to be encouraged together with attendance at officially organised District, Region and Zone Meetings, socials, fund raising, Forums and training sessions. This year my club has made several visits to other clubs and have found that they have learned an awful lot about what other clubs do. Whilst all clubs have the same Purposes and Ethics they all operate differently and good ideas can be picked up by making such visits.

It is also good for all Lions to attend Zone Meetings and District events and the point system is waited to encourage this. A lot of hard work goes into arranging all kinds of District events and so much can be learned from attending our Convention, the Young Ambassador Weekend, Incoming Officers Training days and other occasions.

It can be even more interesting to attend MD events especially MD Convention and even International Convention. Just meeting Lions from other clubs both locally and from further a field can be fulfilling and life time friendships can be started at such forums.

So when you make your visits take a Visiting Lion form with you, get it signed and enter our Competition. The more clubs that enter the better as it is good to have competition amongst the clubs.

Please contact me for any advice or help and **PLEASE** start participating I will be reporting progress on the web and in the District Newsletter. Wouldn't' it be

great to see your Club's name there?


The speeches were followed by superb music by the band of the Blues and Royals.
