PEACE POSTER TROPHIES

There are four Peace Poster Competitions in all and information on how to enter the competitions can be found on the District website under Projects.

The Godwin Micallef Cup was given in Godwin's year as Governor (2006/7). It is awarded to the club who submitted the District winning entry in the official Multiple District Competition, the winner of which goes forward to the International Competition. The age range for this cup is 11-13 years. Godwin's aim, in presenting this cup, was to encourage Clubs to take part in the Peace Poster Competition.

The Bill Smith Trophies for the District Peace Poster competitions are in three categories: 7-8years, 9-10 years and CAD. To date the CAD cup has never been awarded, so how about trying to find some budding computer literate youngsters who can design a Peace Poster.

The cups were given in memory of Lion Bill Smith who was originally a member of Portsmouth City Lions Club. He then became a Charter Member of The Lions Club of Fareham almost 50 years ago. He was always a club Lion and although always supporting the District would never accept a Cabinet position . He was a sponsor Lion to two District Governors -Ernie Howard and Pat Nixon. Bill and his wife were always at every event and he was easily recognised by his yellow bowler hat. In the late 90's his wife suffered a stroke and, as their son and daughter and families lived abroad, Bill became sole carer and consequently his own health suffered. He died in 2006 and his wife just recently.

He had a tremendous rapport with youngsters and was renowned in the area for being Father Christmas for many schools and other groups as well as Lions. He was a well known figure in Fareham and was a Citizen of the Year.

On his death in 2006 his family asked for donations to be given to Fareham Lions who then decided that monies should be given to his local church and that the club would spend the remainder on recognition of his lions work with youth. This coincided with 105 D introducing new categories for the Peace Poster and so The Bill Smith Memorial Cups were presented.

There is another memorial to Bill - the centrepiece of the sensory garden at the Rainbow Centre in Fareham is a Lion Glockenspiel called LION BILL.
