During the risk assessment, the dangers associated with Face Painting were also explored. The advice received was conflicting and it was decided to seek an alternative attraction. The shops chosen to take part in the "Find the Lions" competition were very supportive and willingly participated. Unfortunately the same cannot be said of the Basingstoke PRO who took fright and ran away to America leaving Lion Ann to mount her own PR offensive. Now I've no idea how offensive she was, but she was certainly very successful. The newspapers, local radio, community and parish magazines all rallied to the cause and not only published her articles but put the event on Facebook and Twitter too.

And everything came together like clockwork!!! More than 23,000 Lions and guests from around the world, traveled to Hawaii for the 98^{th} International Convention, held at the Hawaii Convention Center from 26 to 30 June 2015.

We had 110 members and partners from MD105, but just nine from 105D.

On the Saturday morning, the International Parade took place, with more than 10,000 members in national dress and costume, together with bands and floats. To introduce MD105 we had the Celtic Drums and Pipes of Hawaii, and also an open Corvette decorated with flags, bunting and balloons, before the main bulk of our members.

That evening, at the Hawaii Convention Center, the International Show was held, with varied acts and dancers, culminating with a set from C&W star Kenny Loggins.

Sunday 28 June, at 9.30 am, saw the first (opening) plenary session of the Convention, where a wonderful flag ceremony, parading all 211 flags of the nations in LCI was held. An inspiring speech was given by Tim Shriver (nephew of Teddy Kennedy) who is CEO of Special Oyympics, based in the United States. He was truly brilliant, and gave a marvelous insight into this worldwide organization. The current world games are being held in Los Angeles.

On Monday, in the second plenary session, all the International Director candidates and 2^{nd} Vice President candidates give their presentations.

On Monday evening, the B & I Reception was held at the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel and more than 600 guests attended from around the world. This is the event, in which the outgoing Council Chairman, Lion Michael Phillips handed over to incoming Council Chairman Lion Simon Moss, who then introduces all the new District Governors. PID Howard Lee then made a brief introduction, and introduced PID Lion Phil Nathan, and between them they introduced any VIP guests who attended, who were many any varied, including PIP Sid Scruggs III, PIP Jim, Irvine, PIP Jimmy Ross, IPP Barry Palmer and many other guests. We were delighted also to welcome Tina Yap and Terry Quinn from the Celtic Pipes, to play for us early on and then pipe in the new DGs.

On Tuesday 30 June at the closing Plenary session of Convention, we listened, again to a very strong speak, from Carolyn Miles, President and CEO of Save the Children. Carolyn was also presented with the Lions 2015 Humanitarian ward, the highest honour of the Association, which is for \$250,000 from LCIF for continuing humanitarian services. Previous recipients have included President Jimmy Carter, Mother Teresa and Condoleeza Rice.

The new International President Lion Dr Jitsuhiro Yamada of Mindokamo, Gifu, Japan, was sworn in as 2015 - 2016 International President, by Immediate Past President Lion Joe Preston. President Yamada is a neurosurgeon and gave a very emotional inaugural speech. Also elected as 2^{nd} International Vice President was Lion Naresh Aggarwal of Dehli, India.

We all left, tired and happy, and now ready for Fukuoka, Japan, in 2016.

Windsor Lions Horseride on track for another win



The Great Park charity spectacular continues to sparkle

Windsor Lions' biggest fundraiser in the Club's calendar, the Horseride in Windsor Great Park, is on track to meet the target of 600 riders for yet another year. The marketing campaign for this popular event, this year on 12 and 13 September, is now in full swing and entries have already exceeded 300 with (at the time of writing) five weeks to go.

Organiser Lion Mark Fraser enthuses: "We are delighted once again with the interest in the Ride. The new look we introduced last year proved so popular that we are repeating that winning formula. Riders from all over the south and east of England and the Midlands have entered and it will be great if we can meet our target of 600 riders."

The event is in its 40th year and has raised more than £2 million for local good causes as well as giving thousands of riders the amazing opportunity of riding in the glorious surroundings of Windsor Great Park. The nine mile course consists of three courses running side-by-side - Advanced, Novice and Non-Jumping, something for every rider. Funds are raised through entry fees and sponsorship with trophies awarded at the end the event.

Lion Mark Fraser concludes: "As ever we are hoping to raise a lot of money for local charities and good causes. The event is all about having fun and raising money. We are very grateful to the Shanly Foundation for sponsoring the event. Sophie Christiansen, triple equestrian Gold Medallist in the London 2012 Paralympics, is also a great supporter and joins me in encouraging all riders to join us in September." Immediately on receipt of the letter from MD105 regarding the Sight Impaired & Limbless Veterans appeal, Blandford & District Lions were galvanised into action as they seized on a perfect fundraising opportunity happening just two days later.

Due to have a stall at Milton Abbas Street Fair on 25 July attended by 6,000 people, a member created a notice to the effect that all proceeds from the Lions stall would go to the UK appeal. This must have struck a chord with the visitors - quite possibly because Blandford is a military town and home of the Royal Signals Corp - and £450 was raised on the day. The Club has added £50 and sent a donation of £500. The Street Fair normally generates a revenue of c. £200 for Blandford so this was an excellent result this time around!
