

Henstridge RDA is a voluntary service and aims to enable as many people of all ages and ability to ride a horse. Tessa advises that although the RDA tag is Riding for the Disabled there are many users of the service who may not wish to be called disabled - for these people RDA means Riding Develops Abilities.

Many local schools take advantage of this service together with those getting over accidents or illness and the many volunteers ensure that there is always at least a one to one volunteer/rider ratio.

There are currently eight horses/ponies available to ride but in the event of inclement weather or if anyone either cannot physically get on a horse or are of a nervous disposition there are two mechanical horses that will provide a great stepping stone to the real thing.

The Blackmore Vale Lions were very pleased to present this cheque to Henstridge RDA as it is these local charities and good causes that provide a service to the community that Lions take great joy in supporting.

Windsor Lions distribute thousands to local good causes




£500 helps buy a scramble net
