Since the last edition I have attended the Council of Governors meeting on 29 to 31 January where most of the Saturday was taken up with restructuring of the Multiple District. The result was that there will be two resolutions which will affect the future of this District. There will be one resolution for eight districts which will keep us more or less intact including the Channel Islands, but will be renamed District SC (South Central). The second resolution will be for seven districts which will see us dispersed between districts SE and SW. If this were to happen then the communication and administration would have to be electronic rather than personal, Cabinet meetings would still have to be convened and travelling for members would in some cases be in excess of 100 miles each way making overnight accommodation a necessity. With regard to Clubs and Zones, there will be very little change other than the fact that it could affect annual dues which in some cases could be higher that we are used to.

The fact of the matter is, if we are to remain more or less as we are, albeit under a different name, we have to field as many delegates as possible at the MD Convention in May to ensure that our votes count.

More than 450 registered to run the race however, probably due to the inclement weather, some 375 runners of all ages took part in the 24th half marathon and 5 mile Fun Run organised by the Club with the valuable cooperation of Bishops Caundle Parish Council, All Saints Primary School, Bishops Caundle Village Hall Committee and Bishops Caundle Football Club.

The race is part of the Dorset Road Race League and is for many the first organised race of the year. Many runners use as preparation for the London Marathon in April.

The men's race was won byToby Chapman of Bournemouth AC in a time of 1h 15 28s and the women's race by Emma Dews of Bournemouth AC in a time of 1h 26m 49s.

Windsor Lions launch Prostate Cancer Screening Initiative

The Windsor Lions are promoting free screening for prostate cancer which will take place from 4.30 to 8.30 pm on Tuesday 12 April at Combermere Barracks. This is an excellent opportunity for any male in the 'at risk' age group to have his prostate checked for the most common form of cancer in men.

Lion Diane Purchase, the event's organisers, says: "We are keen to undertake a second prostate cancer awareness event following the success of the one we ran in June 2014 when more than 250 men attended and some were diagnosed with prostate problems—a few with a serious condition. Early intervention undoubtably helped and in some cases may have saved lives."

The event is FREE and Windsor Lions are encouraging men aged 45 and more to come along for a PSA blood test. A top urologist will be on call to answer any questions and give information, all If which will be treated in strict confidence.

A heartrending story

Teenager Hannah Moore is battling to a rare disease that is robbing her of her career and medal-winning sport. Hannah, 18, developed complex regional pain syndrome after having surgery for an ingrowing toenail on her right foot two years ago. Now the agonising condition has worsened, forcing her to put her training as a chef with a place at a top London hotel on hold. She has also had to give up Washinkai Karate—a sport where she holds a black belt and at 15 years old won a national championship.

Hannah, who lives in Stalbridge, Dorset, says she believes that amputation of part of her right leg could be the only way that she could return to her career. However, despite the condition which causes her to take up to 40 pills a day to combat the pain, she has begun competing in Wheelchair Athletics. She launched a campaign to raise money to purchase a sports wheelchair and equipment for wheelchair racing plus other equipment to enable her to keep as fit as she can.

Having heard of her campaign, Blackmore Vale Lions are supporting Hannah by purchasing the Sports Wheelchair for her which was delivered at the end of February
