SAVE OUR WORLD

We hear much in the media about the problems facing the world with regard to the environment and since October 1972 Lions have been encouraged to do what they can to protect and improve the environment. Stuart Gratix (Environmental Officer for 105BN) has come up with a list of simple ideas which every Lion can adopt and advise members of the public to do the same. They may sound obvious but if we all adopt them then we can make a difference!

Save Our World (SOW) Sow and You will Reap the Benefits The following ideas will help

Only put enough water in the kettle that you need; Don't leave the tap running when cleaning your teeth; Don't spend excessive time in the shower;

Only put the washer on when you have a full load;

- Don't use the spin dryer or tumble dryer when you can hang your washing out;
- Turn the microwave off when not in use. The clock uses more electricity than it uses when cooking;
- Don't leave electric items on standby;
- Don't leave mobiles on charge when fully charged;

Don't leave PCs on charge when fully charged;

- Don't throw edible food away;
- Don't leave unwanted lights on; Don't leave windows and doors open when the heating
- is on;

Don't leave the engine running when loading or unloading the car;

Only flush the toilet on small flush when possible; and Remember to recycle all you can, e.g. batteries, spectacless, hearing aids, etc.

Introduction

I wrote my last Newsletter on 20 September and made reference to 'the work of LCIF goes on, with natural disasters occurring in different parts of the world with regularity..'. How true this was, with Hurricane Matthew occurring at the end of September into early October with winds up to 145 mph and torrential rain. This hurricane affected the entire Caribbean area, particularly the western edge, and in the USA North Carolina, Florida and Georgia were hit. Hurricane Matthew's path also impacted Newfoundland and Labrador in Canada. To date LCIF has awarded eight emergency grants of £7,500.

In Haiti the Lions were able to immediately respond and Lions and Leos packed and helped distribute 1,500 disaster kits to hurricane victims in more remote regions where help would likely be delayed. The Lions have been in regular communication with LCIF sending updates. The local Lions did report that the homes built following the 2010 earthquake in Blanchard, Cite Soleil were not impacted by the storm. The Lions of Haiti are consulting with local relief agencies (i.e. Red Cross and UNICEF) to identify more strategic approaches for their on-going relief efforts. It is expected that additional requests from other Districts for emergency grants will be received in the coming days.

There are always long-term requirements such as rebuilding and the like. I am certain that LCIF will be helping in Haiti, and also Italy, with not only the immediate aid but also the funding of rebuilding of a particular project or projects in conjunction with the local Lions Clubs.

Thank you on behalf of LCIF to all those Clubs that have donated to the special appeals for Italy and Haiti. If any further Clubs wish to donate, these should be sent to the District Treasurer marked 'LCIF Disaster Fund'. These donations will count towards credits for future Melvin Jones Fellowships.

Spot the District Governor!

Well, we're four months into our Centennial year, so let's take time to take stock!

It has been a very enjoyable and interesting period for the District Governor Team. We've visited the vast majority of our Clubs and have been very impressed wherever we have been and would like to thank you all for your hospitality and hard work.

Those of you at Convention may remember that I said that I would like to focus on four things:

- Membership recruitment and retention through satisfaction;
- Centennial, especially reporting the activities we already undertake;
- Our continued support of Special Olympics for those with learning difficulties; and
- Our global achievements within LCIF.

Membership: We have a net increase of 22 members so far. I believe the session we provided on recruitment and retention was well received by those present. Although some of the ideas may have been heard before, the question to be asked should be "If it worked for another Club, what did they do different from us?" – not "We've tried that before and it didn't work".

Centennial: I was delighted to receive patches for 40 of our Clubs to acknowledge their contribution to our targets in 2015-16. It should be more but some Clubs are simply not completing their Monthly Activity Reports to show the work they are doing; it's not a check on Clubs, it's a way of building up a larger picture of our efforts to use in future PR releases.

Special Olympics: I am grateful to those Clubs who have contributed to my appeal so far. It was also good to see the local Special Olympics group at the Bournemouth Healthy Living event. We really do need to support this venture – especially as Lions are providing the Families Programme at the national games in Sheffield, the cost of which could be around £25,000. I would be immensely grateful if more Clubs were to donate towards this appeal as soon as possible as we need to finance aspects of this programme in advance.

LCIF: A big 'thank you' to our Clubs who have contributed to LCIF since July; I was proud to see that our District is the largest contributor, donating 20 per cent of the moneys received from this country so far. This is OUR international charity and deserves all the support we can give it.

The subject of redistricting continues to be discussed in the background and all Clubs will have received an indication of the proposed resolution agreed by Council for discussion at the MD Convention. Significantly, the proposal leaves our District largely intact; however, it will depend upon sufficient votes being recorded in Blackpool in March.

Finally, and I make no apology for ending on a sad note, I have attended the funerals of three Lions in recent weeks. The years of dedicated service they have given our District and Lions Clubs International as a whole were humbling and, in acknowledging their contributions, I can only hope to live up to the shining examples they left behind.

HAITI HEARTBREAK

The Lions International Funding has been busy once again following the damage caused by Hurricane Matthew, Lions organisations in Haiti and adjoining islands together with the mainland areas of the United States have been given financial support to assist with emergency needs with the promise of further help once their full need have been investigated and costed.

The situation in Haiti is further complicated by the lack of clean water which has led to an unwelcome epidemic of cholera. The Lions Clubs of the UK have agreed to fund and supply portable purification units to help control the disease. Reading Club has agreed to donate £500 which will cover the cost of two units. If as is expected this will be repeated across the country it is hoped that the epidemic can be contained and conquered very soon

News from the Clubs



Now here's a legacy and a half for our community. Fleet Lions gave their local nature conservation group, Fleet Pond Society, a grant of £12,000 (their biggest ever by far) to build a major new viewpoint to overlook Hampshire's biggest freshwater lake, Fleet Pond. The Lions grant paid for the bits and the Pond Society and chums screwed it all together! And what a great pleasure it was for the Lions to hear that the Pond Society had decided the new platform would be named Lions' View. To top it off the Pond Society have installed a plaque to commemorate the Lions centennial. The public are using the viewpoint frequently which is fully accessible to prams, wheelchairs and mobility scooters. And they are very excited and appreciative of the new views it has opened up. It is a fitting tribute to the Lions International centenary.

Fleet Lions had been involved with the nature reserve for years after Lion Linda Picton from Hart Lions had introduced us and our former Leo Club to their conservation tasks (slash and burn generally!). We saw all the amazing things that were going on to help restore the Pond in the last few years and as a major voluntary group in the local community we felt we needed to do our bit too. We asked what was on the Pond Society's wish list that they didn't have funding for. A new viewpoint was the reply. The cost was expected to be around $\pounds 12,000$ just for the materials. Our members were keen to help provide this major improvement for people's enjoyment at the Pond which is one of our biggest local amenities. But there were no viewpoints to enjoy the scenery and wildlife from the side of the lake where in the past Geoffrey de Havilland had tested his floatplanes.

So we agreed to fund the cost of construction materials. The Society's volunteers cleared the area (we did a bit too!) before constructing this major piece of engineering.

Fleet Pond was dug out as a medieval fishery to supply the Bishop of Winchester and was designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest to protect its wildlife, one of the first in the United Kingdom. Unfortunately that didn't stop the Ministry of Defence allowing silt to wash down from their nearby land into it after they chopped the tops of a few local hills as part of the



privatisation of their airport at Farnborough. The situation became so bad that it was possible to walk across the lake without the water going above your knees. The water was permanently murky and hardly anything could live in it.

The Pond Society had been lobbying for many years to rectify the situation and a new piece of legislation, the Water Framework Directive required that it was sorted out. Major funds were made available by the Environment Agency and Natural England to allow the Pond to be partially dredged and the Pond's owners, the local (Hart) council, also made funds available. The MoD also got stuck in with new measures to stop further silt ingress into the lake. So far over \pounds Im has been spent dredging and creating new islands for water birds with the silt and the project has won a sustainability award from the Institution of Civil Engineers.

The day was a financial success, also, with over £110 being collected by Blandford Lions in an hour and a half – this will be donated to the Dorset Blind Association.

Once again the good people of Basingstoke, along with opticians Boots, Leighton's, Specs Warehouse and Vision Express, heeded the call from the Basingstoke Lions Club and produced a healthy number of redundant spectacles for recycling and distribution to those countries where they will be most needed. Other organisations who contributed included Open Sight, Helping Hands for the Blind, the Macular Disease Society, the Council's Sensory Team, the Housebound Library and Festival Place and the Malls who hosted the event.

The Lion (pictured below), as ever, proved to be a popular collector of specs and received many an 'aaah' and an 'oooh' from various donors (not just the children!), allowing himself



to be peered at and metaphorically 'measured' as part of free competition to guess his height.

The winner will receive two tickets to a Lions musical event of his or her choice.
