Page Two - Lions Appeal

A personal plea from PDGs Lions Mike and Brigid Hendy

Water for Kunkujang, The Gambia

We are prompted to write this appeal by the full page advert for Wamagazine as Water Aid do not have any programmes in The Gambia and, as there are no Lions Clubs in The Gambia, projects for that country do not qualify for LCIF matched funding

In January 2016, we visited The Gambia principally for a holiday but also to visit Brigid's sister (a nun with the Missionaries of Charity Order) and an old Lion friend of ours who studied in the United Kingdom but who is now living and working in The Gambia as a child development worker with ChildFund International.

In The Gambia 48 per cent of the two million population live below the poverty line and only five per cent is over 60 (the median age of the population is 19 as quoted by the BBC in December). it amazed us to note that a two litre bottle of water in The Gambia costs the same as in a supermarket in the UK yet the average wage is just £35 per month. Our friend took us out to one of the villages he is responsible for – Gunjar Kunkujang – a village with a core population of about 2000 people but rising to about 10,000 in the wider area. Just nine taps currently supply the villagers with clean water, one of which is dedicated to a school of 800 pupils! Sitting and discussing with the village chief and his elders about how we might help, they had two requests:

- To have access to a mobile medical facility for basic healthcare: and

- To be able to increase the nine taps to about 25 so that potentially they could serve up to 10,000 people.

We went back again in November 2016 (two further trips are planned for 2017), and the visit resulted in three very positive outcomes:

- We were able to secure a mobile medical facility to visit a village just two kilometres away once a month;

- We met with a new contractor and agreed a programme of works for the creation of a second tower using a redundant borehole which will increase the output from 5,000 litres a day to 120,000 – it will also mean each tower and borehole will have a back up; and

- We secured an agreement with the country Director for ChildFund International for them to monitor and report, on our behalf, how the money was being spent in the same way that a Club or District would with an LCIF grant.

So far with limited local fundraising we have reached the £3,000 mark and we need £5,000 to get the programme kick-started to erect the second tower, put up the solar panels and put in the pumps. Brigid and I are funding all the peripheral works and our travel ourselves, so every penny donated to the Bracknell Forest Lions Gambia Appeal is accounted for. More detail on the appeal can be found on the website which links to the My Donate page we have set up (www.gambia.bracknellforestlions.org.uk) – if you can help us with this appeal (and some Clubs in MD105 have already done so) then please do, otherwise the project will take a long time and they need clean, fresh water **NOW**.

Please send cheques to Bracknell Lions Club made out to 'Bracknell Forest Lions Club – Gambia Appeal'.

PS. We already know that another Club from 105C – Bramley and Wickersley - was out there distributing goods they had shipped in while we were there, as were other volunteer groups and members of the NHS – what a pity all this activity could not be co-ordinated by some umbrella organisation?

Around 2,600 athletes – *many from our every county in our District, including the Channel Islands* - with intellectual disabilities, of all ages and abilities will come together from across the country to compete in 19 sports. Introduction

In my September article I made reference to the fact that LCIF never knows when the next emergency will arise. On 7 December a 6.5 magnitude earthquake struck the Aceh province of Indonesia. More than 100 people died and many were injured. LCIF responded immediately with two grants of $\pounds 8,000$ and $\pounds 80,000$ for both immediate and longer-term relief.

LCIF disaster grants

In November 2016 ten emergency grants totalling £80,000 were made addressing immediate needs for floods, hurricanes, earthquakes and wild-fires around the world.

Sight for Kids Programme

Many of you will be familiar with Helen Keller's plea for Lions to be 'knights of the blind' as far back as 1925. Since that time Lions' services relating to sight have been met in a very large number of ways. LCIF has had a partnership for almost 15 years with Johnson & Johnson Vision Care Inc (J & J) and as far back as 2002 LCIF and J & J launched a joint initiative 'Sight for Kids'. This is a school-based programme that mobilises volunteers to provide vision screening, professional eye examinations, spectacles and other services. This programme has become one of the Lions' largest and most impactful partnership programmes.

The most recent figures show that more than 125,000 Lions and other volunteers have worked to bring the 'Sight for Kids' programme to more than 20 million children throughout Asia, India and the Philippines. Sight for Kids has referred more than 800,000 children to eye care professionals for further evaluation and provided spectacles to more than 250,000 children. The programme now includes children in Turkey and Kenya. I believe this is another excellent example of the work done by our own Charity.

LCIF Measles and Rubella Initiative

As we move into the last twelve months of the Measles and Rubella Initiative I would like to repeat my previous comments on this amazing children's humanitarian initiative. This is still continuing and tens of thousands of deaths have been averted – mostly of children. £16 million has been raised to date. LCIF has committed to providing Gavi Alliance (a public-private partnership whose mission is to save children's lives and protect people's health) a further £8 million by December 2017. In 2016 Lions and partners have conducted measles activities in six countries and over the next year this will extend into another five or more countries with support from local Lions who play a key role in social mobilisation efforts by working with local leaders, coordinating community-level publicity and serving as volunteers at vaccination centres. Until the involvement of Gavi and LCIF approximately four hundred children were dying every day from measles and rubella. I do hope your Club can make a donation, or further donation, to the LCIF Measles and Rubella Initiative.

Melvin Jones Fellowships

Lions help with Free Prostate (PSA) Testing in Dorset



Wimborne and Ferndown Lions have collaborated with the Dorset branch of the PCaSO (Prostate Cancer Support Organisation) to provide a free screening session for PSA testing in Colehill, Wimborne.

According to Jim Davis, chairman of the PCaSO Dorset branch, the facts are: 1) without screening, around 42,000 men are

diagnosed with prostate cancer in the UK each year. 2) almost 11,000 men die of prostate cancer annually. 3) caught in the early stages, cure rates are dramatically improved with well over 80 per cent success.

PCaSO is offering and conducting PSA tests this Autumn/Winter at Dorchester, Kinson, Ringwood, Colehill, Bridport, Christchurch and Parley. The testing is conducted by trained phlebotomists. All blood samples are sent to the Dorset County Hospital, Dorchester for analysis and the results are then issued a few days later to the men by the urologist.

The recent event at Wimborne resulted in 53 men being tested at the Reef Centre, Colehill where only two men were referred on to their GP, which led the urologist to comment that Colehill "must be one of the healthiest areas in the UK!" *Pictured is VDG Lion Peter Burnett from the Lions Club setting the ball rolling.*

Make use of every PR opportunity

An ideal example of this came to my Club - Farnborough through a Facebook message from a member of the marketing team at Think Ford, a large Ford franchise. They asked if they could collect non-perishable foods and tinned goods to donate to their local Lions Club Christmas Hamper Appeal. They had already set up a collection in their Guildford showroom for the Guildford Lions Club's Christmas food collection.

This was an opportunity not to be missed and on accepting Think Ford's offer, events moved quickly with them asking for a press release detailing the work of Farnborough Lions during the Christmas period and any other thing we'd like adding to the promotion. Apart from sending out social media updates, that was all Farnborough Lions had to do. With the benefit of a professional marketing team behind them, much goodwill built up between the Lions and the motor dealership, opening opportunities to include them again in a similar way for future Lions events.

The icing on the cake were the goods donated by Think Ford's staff and customers during the three week collection. A dozen boxes filled with packets and tins were loaded into my car and taken to The Vine Centre, a refuge and drop in centre providing shelter for vulnerable young adults throughout Christmas.

A further benefit were the teddy bears and soft toys and lots of 'easy read' children's books which were donated to the Children's Ward at Frimley Park Hospital.

A very positive outcome for Lions, the community and a local business.

My advice - take the opportunity of seizing positive PR opportunities with local businesses!
