

We get a lot of phishing and spam emails, most of which are removed by our email servers, but if you receive an email with attached documents, even if it purports to be from someone you know, be suspicious unless it is clear from the email text that it really is from who you think it is.

To help guard against this menace:

- 1. Don't send WORD DOC files unless absolutely necessary - i.e. you expect the recipient to change them - save them as PDF files and send those. DOC files can contain malicious macros which run on opening the file.
- 2. The same applies to spreadsheets, Publisher and Powerpoint files.
- 3. Always sign-off your messages with your name and preferably your job title/Club, etc. so that the recipient can have more confidence in the authenticity. However remember that even these can be forged.
- 4. Don't send attachments with terse messages such as "You'll love this" or "This is really funny". I never open these, nor should you.
- 5. Avoid sending attachments altogether - we often send/ receive an attached DOC file but the text could have just as easily been incorporated in the email body. If you send an email as HTML, you can format it just as you would a Word document.
- 6. Don't send unusual file formats such as MHT and RTF without explaining why. Many such documents are banned by our servers, e.g. JS (JavaScript files).
- 7. If you receive an offer that is too good to be true, it probably is.
- 8. No genuine website administrator will ask you to confirm your account details or passwords. That applies to us just as much as it does to banks.
- 9. When I am stranded in outer Mongolia having lost my passport and wallet, I won't email you asking for help!

My Story Lion Debbie Burnett

Firstly I would like to thank the Clubs who have donated to **Different Strokes**, either to me or via Lion Linda Picton and the District Charity Account. It has now been confirmed that we will be having two representatives from the charity at the Convention in March. We are also hoping that their local branch will man an information desk in the exhibition area.

I know that the DG Team has told you an abbreviated version of my story so I would like to give you more details.

Our daughter Beth was born on 7 February 2002, I didn't feel right straight away but the hospital fobbed me off with 'You've just had a baby, you will not feel normal'. I have two older children so I knew the feeling was different from when I had them. I was sent home the next day and still did not feel right but could not put my finger on what was wrong. Nine days later, when Peter finished work, he took Beth for a walk in her pram. While he was out I remember feeling scared, knowing something had happened but not sure what.



Peter was not out for long and as soon as he returned he saw that my face had drooped on the right side, I couldn't talk and he says he could see how scared my eyes were. He knew what had happened and immediately called 999. A paramedic, followed by an ambulance, arrived and I was rushed to Poole Hospital. That evening I had two more strokes and was in the high dependency unit for several days.

I cannot fault the care I received but I recall that I could not remember how to do anything. I ended up watching all the Winter Olympics, not because I was enjoying it but because I didn't know how to change the channel! I could only say the word 'yes' so I answered that to every question. Peter tells me that some nurses would ask me my name and where I was and 'yes' was duly recorded on my chart. However they phrased the questions, the answer was always the same. Peter noticed, before the medical staff, that they were asking the wrong questions.

I did make quite a quick partial recovery and was allowed home after ten days. Thank goodness, my mother and Peter were there as I had to re-learn everything. There was no support for younger stroke victims then since the Stroke Association was there for older victims.

I have made a good recovery and most people who meet me would not know my past but I was lucky, both with my family support and that Peter did push me to achieve more than I thought I could. There are many stroke sufferers much worse off than me and we came across a support group for younger stroke victims called **Different Strokes** at the Lions MD Conventions in Manchester and Eastbourne. They really do support younger victims with, among other things, advice lines, a Facebook group and local meetings.

Please ask your Club to consider a donation towards this amazing charity to enable them to increase the work they do. Thanks to your generosity we are hoping to present a significant sum to them at the Convention in Portsmouth.

Introduction:

Once again on behalf of LCIF a very big thank you to those Clubs that have donated to LCIF these last few weeks.

Humanitarian Grants:

At the October 2017 Board meeting a total of 48 Humanitarian Grants were approved totalling £3,280,842 for a variety of projects around the world. The complete list of projects and amounts granted can be seen at http://www.lcif.org/EN/apply-for-a-grant/recent-grants.php.

International Assistance Grant:

I am pleased to report that Bracknell Club successfully applied for a grant to enable improved water supplies to be provided under a project they are involved with in Gunjar Kunkujang, Gambia. A grant of £7,200 was provided by LCIF and this, together with the matching funds from Bracknell Club, will provide for much improved water supplies for this area.

Disaster Grants:

Since my last Newsletter LCIF has awarded 16 disaster grants totalling £112,290 for assistance in areas around the world effected by hurricanes, floods, windstorms, volcano activities, wildfires, tornadoes and typhoons.

Melvin Jones Fellowships (MJFs)

I would remind you again that a very large number of Clubs have sufficient credits to be able to award one or more (in some cases many) Melvin Jones Fellowships. Please let me know if you wish to be made aware of your Club's credits. Even if these do not amount to US\$1,000, a Club can pay the difference between the credit and the required amount and still obtain the MJF.

Fund raising for a great cause!

The Meon Valley Lions barbeque was busy again this October at the bi-annual Wickham charity beer festival. As well as raising over £700 from the sale of burgers and sausages, we took the opportunity to organise a bucket collection and dedicate the fundraising at this event to a specific project – a special Duet-bike for Ella!



Ella lives in Shirrell Heath and is 10 years old. She suffers from Rett Syndrome, a rare neurological disorder resulting in severe mental and physical disability. There is no known cure. The specially adapted bike costs £7,334 and will allow the whole family (including her twin sister Jess) to enjoy time together going on cycle rides, while she still has some awareness of her surroundings. The family, with donations from the Rotary Club and the Pindar Trust, had already raised £4,419. The Meon Valley Lions intend to make up the remaining £2,915 from the Beer festival BBQ takings, the generous £168 donated in our collection buckets by the drinkers, plus the balance from our charity funds. This means that Ella's family should be able to order the bike in time for Christmas – which is a great result.

WOKINGHAM LIONS CLUB COLLECT FOOD FOR NEEDY AND ELDERLY

Donations taken on 2, 3 and 7 December

As the festive season approaches, many of the needy and elderly homebound residents in Wokingham are alone and on tight budgets. The Wokingham Lions Club is working to collect and deliver food parcels to them before Christmas. The annual Christmas Collection kicks off on Saturday 2 December outside Waitrose in Wokingham when Wokingham Lions will be collecting from 9 am to 4 pm and again at Sainsbury's on Sunday 3 Deceber and Tesco on Thursday 7 December, both from 9 am to 4 pm.

Shoppers will be asked to support the Christmas Collection by purchasing an extra item of shopping and donate it to the Wokingham Lions Club. "We are looking for canned food, biscuits, preserves, mince pies, Christmas pudding and sweets. The generosity of Wokingham residents is much appreciated," says Lion John Cleary, organiser of the Christmas Collection.

The Lions assemble the foodstuffs into parcels which they then deliver to private homes and care homes before Christmas. "It is wonderful to see the smiles on people's faces when they receive the food parcels. Many of them write thank-you notes which are quite heart-warming," says Lion John.

Membership Update



This is the first in what I hope will become a regular update on membership in 105D to help with ideas and suggestions that can assist your Club with membership. This first article is looking at recruitment.

All Clubs should be constantly looking to promote membership of Lions in all of their activities and to have recruiting of new members at the top of their agenda.

- New members provide fresh blood and ideas to your Club; and
- Having a flow of new members is vital for all Clubs, even with those with a current healthy membership, to ensure that their Club remains strong.

Recruitment through Service

Community service is key to Lions Clubs and we can look to use local service to recruit new members and also help to improve the retention within our Club. One idea is to look to introduce new members to Lions through initial volunteering, which is potentially an easier way for Clubs to approach potential new members.

Indentify a local community need in your area. Through local advertising ask for volunteers to assist with the community service project. Invite volunteers to a social evening and encourage them to bring other volunteers with them. At a later date, once the project is underway, the volunteers can then be approached to join Lions by a couple of Club members, as this is a much stronger approach.


Recruitment campaigns

- Have Lions publicity available at all Lions events and, if you have the resources, at larger events have a membership stall;
- Maximise local media for publicising events and also for membership. Not just newspapers and radio stations but Facebook and other forms of social media;
- If you are holding a service project event, think about enlisting some younger people from your community. Give them a job and tabard to give them a sense of importance, keep inviting them and they will hopefully wish to join your Club;
- Support is available from the GMT team and Zone to assist with membership recruitment.; and District funding is available for smaller Clubs who wish to run membership recruitment campaigns.
