Do you have used hearing aids (analogue or digital) or audiological equipment such as ear hooks and ear moulds? These items can be recycled, and for the last 26 years, Lions in this Multiple District have been involved in the Collection of Used Hearing Equipment Project.

Once received it is refurbished - cleaned and repaired. The refurbished hearing equipment is then sent abroad to support projects dedicated to assisting hearing impaired children and adults. People living in Central and South America, Africa, Asia and the Ukraine have received such equipment.

This opens up a whole new world to them and they can enjoy hearing the sounds of life we take for granted.

Dr Michael Nolan of the Starkey Hearing Foundation receives donated equipment, sorts it in to make and model and packs it ready for onward shipping for refurbishment. He also finds hearing impaired people abroad who can use this refurbished equipment. If you would like to assist in this worthy project by collecting and then donating to the Used Hearing Equipment effort, please follow the instructions below:-

* To send small numbers of hearing aids, remove them from their boxes, check the battery is removed (to save you postage costs) and post only the bare hearing aids to :-

*If you have a large amount of hearing equipment to donate, you can send it *FREE*. Pack it up; address it to Dr Nolan at the above address. Ring Parcel Force on 0344 800 4466; follow the voice instructions for those with a contract. When an operative answers, quote Contract no. R233259 and say it is for Lions Clubs International. Ask for 48 hour service. They will take details and come and pick the package up. You may wish to put a note inside saying who you are and giving an address or your contact email so the package can be acknowledged and a "Thank You" note sent.

*You can also include Used Hearing Equipment in the same box as Used Spectacles when you send them to Chichester Lions Club. This Used Hearing Equipment will find its way to Michael Nolan. In all cases please remove the batteries from the hearing aids before sending them for recycling.

Although clearly well intentioned, Lion Ken Staniforth's recent letter is a text book example of how not to motivate volunteers. Just as we have the right to express our views within our own Club meetings, we should not be taken to task for being critical of District. At the very least this indicates that we are not apathetic and, as a democratic organisation, we are surely entitled to comment on performance. One would hope, though, that any criticism would be expressed in a courteous manner without resorting to personal abuse. We are, after all, Lions and not Twitter trolls!

Most Lions give freely of their time and money to support their own Club and colleagues, having a passing allegiance to the other Clubs in their Zone and see District as a necessary overhead performing an administrative function. Rather than berating us for not wanting to serve as a District Officer, Lion Ken should, perhaps, be applauding us for what we achieve within our own Clubs when faced with falling membership, no tangible support from higher echelons, a non-existent public profile and competition from organisations that are, to all outward appearances, doing exactly the same as Lions.

His point that there may be members out there that could make a valuable contribution to District is almost certainly correct. However from a personal viewpoint, I have only a certain amount of time that I can give to Lions. If there were more members in my Club, I could perhaps take a step back from the firing line and consider giving time to Zone or District without imposing too heavy an additional burden on friends and colleagues. That is, if I wanted to be an administrator or had aspirations to wear a white tuxedo!

Lion Ken refers to the need for change and I venture to suggest that many of the comments to which he refers might have their basis in the fact that change wasn't either apparent or happening quickly enough for the satisfaction of the troops on the ground. Perhaps talking to members, listening to their views and taking them back to Cabinet ought to be in a District Officer's job description...

WHAT TO DO WITH OLD SPECS POST SPEK TREK

After 35 years Petersfield Lions Club have decided to cease running Spec Trek. We thank them for all their hard work over the years. Coupled with this, Midhurst Lions Club, who carried out the initial sorting of our specs, is no longer is able to perform this task.

The collection of specs for recycling, is a Lions Club International project, and is part of our Centennial Challenge and many of you partake in this activity. It is very important that we continue with collecting specs but the question arose as to what to do with several thousand pairs of specs throughout the District.

Luckily Chichester Lions are able to help us and Lion Sue Boucher who looks after Chichester Lions' Spectacle recycling project says:

"Clubs can either deliver their spectacles directly to Chichester or use the Parcel Force contract to send them. There is a tidy bin at the gate of our workshop where spectacles can be left at any time.

The sending of specs using Parcel Force will have to be staggered throughout the year as Chichester does not have the storage capacity to receive them all at one time. For information and advice on how to send spectacles please contact Lion Sue Boucher of Chichester Lions directly (01243 785737) or email sight@chilions.org.uk For full details of the Chichester Lions workshop and what happens to spectacles please visit their website at www.chilions.org.uk"

The main point to note that is that clubs will need to move away from April for disposing of their specs or this scheme will fail. It is a new way of working, but providing we follow the advice that Sue will give clubs, all should work well and we will be able to continue this valuable Lions service. You can still count the number of specs that you collect and record it on the mylci web site.

On behalf of LCIF I would like to thank all Clubs that have made donations to LCIF since my last newsletter.

Disaster Grants:

I have had to put this newsletter together early this month as I am going away on holiday. I will report on the figures in next month's newsletter.

Melvin Jones Fellowships (MJFs)

Several Clubs have enquired about their credits for Melvin Jones Fellowships. I would remind you again that a very large number of Clubs have sufficient credits to be able to award one or more (in a number of cases many) Melvin Jones Fellowships. Please email me if you wish to be made aware of your Club's credits. Even if these do not amount to US\$1,000, a Club can pay the difference between the credit and the required amount and still obtain the MJF.

Donations:

If your Club has not made a donation to LCIF this fiscal year please discuss and remember LCIF is our charity. Your Club can decide if it wishes its donation to be for 'area of greatest need', disaster, sight or youth. Funding directed to 'area of greatest need' provides LCIF with the ability to financially support any programme and allows the flexibility to supplement initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent and to fund projects that meet diverse community needs beyond sight, disaster and youth, such as water wells and vocational training programmes for the disabled. Payments should be made via the District Treasurer in the usual way, specifying 'LCIF' and the area for which the donation is intended.

LCIF Club Coordinators:

I would remind you again that Lions Clubs International Board has recently approved a policy change where, beginning 1st January 2018, a Club's Immediate Past President shall serve as the Club LCIF Coordinator. If that person is unable to accept the role, or there is already a Club LCIF Officer in place, it can be delegated to another club member. In the coming weeks, current Club Presidents and then Immediate Past Club Presidents will be notified of this policy change.


In the presence of the Mayor and Mayoress of the Royal Borough Cllr John Lenton and Mrs Lenton, the presentation, led by Lion Mark Fraser, spanned the year chronologically, highlighting the Windsor Lions' many and varied activities - fundraising and promotional events and help and support given in the community.

The presentation showed the extent of the service the Lions deliver, summarised as:

- Four defibrillators installed and £14,500 raised by the Windsor Community Project partnership;
- 40 Windsor Foodshare shifts undertaken;
- 28 bus drives for Mencap members;
- Four new Windsor Lions recruited;
- 20 social events undertaken;
- 34 cases of community support delivered with £2,000 donated;
- 12 Leos (Lions of the future) recruited at Windsor Boys School;
- Charitable donations of £50,000

Two surprise awards were made by 105D District Officer Lion Dave Ebsworth - a Lions Centenary badge to Windsor president Lion Paul Maxwell for the Club's exceptional service achievements and a personal award to Lion Mike Sells for his excellent work for Windsor Lions.

The evening was concluded by president Lion Paul Maxwell whose heartfelt address thanked all volunteers, organisations and local charities who help and support the needy in the community and paid tribute to the Club members for all their efforts throughout the year and every year.

Prospective Members

With any prospective members, it is key that we get off on the right foot with them.

- Be welcoming it can be a daunting prospect for some people attending a Lions meeting for the first time;
- Offer them a lift to a meeting;
- Buddy them up with a couple of members to be their initial contact point.;
- Ensure that somebody is made responsible for speaking to them after the meeting and inviting them to your next event/meeting;
- Try to avoid jargon at the meeting and explain the Lions formalities, etc. of your meetings;
- Explain what Lions is about and how your Club fits into the District and Multiple District;
- Explain the structure of your Club and how it works Directors/Trustees, other Officers, Committees, etc;
- Explain costs of membership and set expectations of membership; and
- Take their views on board, it is always beneficial to have new ideas.

We should always consider the ideas from new members – new ideas and different ways of doing things are vital to the success of a Club. Endorsing their ideas will make them feel part of the Lions team within your Club. After they have been to two or three meetings, carry out a survey with them to ask for their views on your Club and if there is anything you could have done to have made the new membership journey better.

Branch Structure

If you have a group of younger members, consider setting up a Branch within your Club to give them the freedom to do things their way and the opportunity to grow and develop as Lions in their own environment. Branch Clubs give younger members a chance not to be restricted by the activities of the more experienced members in your Club and the opportunity to try new ideas. If you need any further information on setting up branch Clubs, please let me know.

In my last article, I was not being dismissive of service, far from it. I was emphasising that the service activity within our Clubs is an excellent opportunity to gain new members by giving them time to experience the service activity first before committing to join.

Social Media a powerful communication tool

The Weymouth and Portland Lions Christmas Day Swim saw a record 483 swimmers taking part, as was reported last month. This amazing result was achieved without any above -the-line advertising or posters at all apart from some free editorials in the local media. Instead the Club used a database of 500 email addresses obtained from previous swimmers for a promotional mailing using 'Mailchimp'. This was followed up with postings to two of the Club's Facebook pages and their Twitter page every other day during the 30 days leading up to Christmas. This resulted in 380 online tickets being purchased up to two days before Christmas Day with 100 tickets being reserved for registration on the day.

A very successful exercise but Clubs are advised to take note of the new data protection laws coming into effect in May. particularly the 'opt out' from mailings, and it is advisable to use programmes like Mailchimp for mailing campaigns.
