In July our International President, Dr Naresh Aggarwal set up the Global Action Team and DG Lion Peter asked me to be the Global Service Team District Coordinator. The role is primarily to work with the District Global Team Membership and Leadership Coordinators and with the Clubs to increase Service. "Providing strong service projects will offer opportunities for our current members to re-engage in Lions. It will also provide opportunities for potential members to see first hand the work we do in our local communities and to learn about our global impact".

I have now attended a meeting of MD District Coordinators and now know a little more about what we will be doing in the MD. LCI have the five areas for Service — Diabetes. Environment, Hunger Relief, Paediatric Cancer and Vision, with diabetes being the main target in the next Lionistic year, with a major launch in Las Vegas at the International Convention. In this MD plans are being made to provide exciting projects and I will introduce them as they become viable.

One of my responsibilities is to encourage Clubs to report their service activities. While many Clubs do report every month there are 17 Clubs who have not submitted one for the current year. Without these reports your Service activities are not known about or recognised. Also reports can give Clubs ideas of new Service which is what Lions is all about. At District level you cannot be considered for some of the awards at Convention if no one knows what you are doing! I therefore urge you to ensure your secretaries do complete the activity reports on the LCI website.

I hope to be able to run a seminar at the Incoming Officers' Training Day. In the meantime I will be at Convention with a stall showing some aspects of the above service areas. If you would like me to include something that your Club has done please let me know the details ASAP.

Also at Convention the various awards will be presented providing a representative of the Club is present. I look forward to seeing you in Southsea!

Introduction:

On behalf of LCIF I would again like to thank all Clubs that have made donations to LCIF since my last newsletter.

Disaster Grants:

In December 2017 LCIF awarded 11 disaster grants totalling £81,650 and in January 2018 six grants totalling £39,000. These were for volcano, earthquake, flood, cyclone, wildfire, hailstorm and tornado relief.

Melvin Jones Fellowships (MJFs):

I would remind you again that a very large number of Clubs have sufficient credits to be able to award one or more (in a number of cases many) Melvin Jones Fellowships. Please email me if you wish to be made aware of your Club's credits. Even if these do not amount to US\$1,000, a Club can pay the difference between the credit and the required amount and still obtain the MJF.

Donations:

Only 50% of Clubs in the District have donated to LCIF this fiscal year. If your Club has not made a donation to LCIF this fiscal year please discuss and remember LCIF is **our** charity. Your Club can decide if it wishes its donation to be for 'area of greatest need', disaster, sight or youth. Funding directed to 'area of greatest need' provides LCIF with the ability to financially support any programme and allows the flexibility to supplement initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent and to fund projects that meet diverse community needs beyond sight, disaster and youth, such as water wells and vocational training programmes for the disabled. Payments should be made via the District Treasurer in the usual way, specifying 'LCIF' and the area for which the donation is intended.

Measles and Rubella Initiative:

I am very pleased to let you know that LCIF has reached the goal of US\$30 million (£21,300,000) which was set some years ago for the Measles and Rubella Initiative. This amount has been increased with donations from the UK Government and the Gates Foundation of US\$15,000 each, making the total amount paid over to GAVI, the immunisation body, of £42,600,000. This will enable 87.7 million children to be immunised and it is estimated 61,000 future deaths to be prevented.

Presentations on LCIF:

As mentioned previously, part of my role is to provide presentations to de-mystify LCIF. These can be given to individual Clubs but preferably to Zone meetings. Please liaise with your Zone Chairman and request a presentation on LCIF.

Blackmore Vale Lions Half Marathon

Sunday 4 February saw the 26^{th} running of the Blackmore Vale Lions Half Marathon which raised around £4,000 to be shared between Victim Support, You First, Mindful, various organisations in Bishops Caundle and the Blackmore Vale Lions Charity Trust Fund which supports a wide range of charitable causes in and around the Blackmore Vale.

There were 418 runners aged from 18 to 77 taking part in the half marathon and five mile Fun Run organised by the Club with the valuable cooperation of Bishops Caundle Parish Council, All Saints Primary School, Bishops Caundle Village Hall and Social Committee.

The race is part of the Dorset Road Race League and is for many the first organised race of the year. Weather conditions were almost perfect, although a bit chilly at the start, for this very tough challenge which many runners use as preparation for the London Marathon in April.

The men's race was won by Toby Chapman of Bournemouth AC in a time of 1h 14m 21s and the women's race by Vicky Ingham of Poole Runners in a time of 1h 29m 53s. The Fun Run winner was Joshua Hopson in a time of 38min 36sec. The first lady was Barbara Murray in a time of 46min 53sec.

As usual the race was very well supported by a large group of marshals, drinks providers, recorders and referees from the road running fraternity especially Gillingham Trotters, a2e Medical Services, and Sturminster Newton Rotary Club, Air Cadets, Templecombe Scouts and most importantly the Blackmore Vale Lions ladies who provided all the food and drink both before and after the event. The Blackmore Vale Lions very much thank and appreciate all the organisations that helped make the event the huge success that it is.

This was offered following the generous donation of £3,900 from 105D Clubs to Anne's chosen charity during my year as District Governor.

The work they are doing is phenomenal, the equipment (most of which is donated) which they are using is state of the art and the types of tumours they are dealing take many forms where each one has to dealt with in a different way and with different types of drugs.



Not only are they doing the research, they also diagnosing from blood and biopsy samples sent to them for analysis.

Bracknell Lions back to The Gambia again

In February two Bracknell Lions travelled to The Gambia for a long weekend to celebrate the opening of the water supply in the village of Gunjar Kunkujang. The water project was launched in August 2016 and by June 2017 had raised £8,000. On the advice of PDG Lion Patrick Hamblin and International Director (designate) PCC Lion Geoff Leeder the Club was advised to apply for an LCIF International Assistance Grant for matched funding. The paperwork was duly completed and despatched to LCIF in August and at the end of October we were informed we had been successful in our application and got a matching grant equivalent to £7,200 – enough to complete the project in one go.

We duly set off for The Gambia in November 2017 secure in the knowledge that we had the funding to authorise the contractor to start work. We also made contact with Banjul Kairo Lions Club whose role it would be to monitor the work taking place and approve the quality at the end. With the help of Lion Kebba Cham – formerly of Burnham



Lions Club – all the various meetings took place to approve the final design, etc. and the contractor was instructed to start work a.s.a.p. With a firm timescale for the project now we returned home and booked a trip back to The Gambia in February 2018 for the official opening. We were accompanied by our daughter and son-in- law as our daughter's school in Wokingham – St Teresa's Catholic Academy of which she is Head Teacher – had twinned with the school in the village and, besides fundraising for the main fund, had donated may items of stationery to the school. In our luggage was a projector and digital camera for the school along with more stationery and other much desired goods for education. The whole opening event was televised and broadcast on the national news; it was also on Gambian Radio and in the news media. The ribbon was cut by the Director of Water Resources for The Gambia and also the Leader of the new National Assembly who has asked us to try to get more projects like this going in The Gambia in conjunction with the Gambian government.

Our work is not finished though; our next project is to provide solar power electricity in the nursery school by July 2018 with funding split 50/50 between Bracknell Lions and St Teresa's Academy. We also have a shopping list of items mainly for the school where five members of staff sleep on a floor each night because, with wages for the top teacher being only £40 per month, they cannot afford to travel home each night (for some as far as 50 km away) and so they only go home at weekends. Bracknell Lions will raise funds for them to be able to buy mattresses or, even better, beds and mattresses. and channel the money through our secure route to enable the goods to be purchased locally, thus ensuring the money goes back into the economy. Other items include marker pens, reconditioned laptops (you provide the old laptop and we get them reconditioned) with the aim eventually of having a full IT suite in the school.

Over the next few months, we will be seeking a cheap way to ship material to The Gambia by means of a small container as some of the stuff the school wants is heavy and far too much for us to carry in our luggage. While it is not practical for everyone to go out to The Gambia and work with the people, please visit Bracknell Lions Gambia Appeal (www.gambia.bracknellforestlions.org.uk website) and contribute via our My Donate page in the event that you wish to help financially as an individual, or donations to Bracknell Forest Lions Gambia Appeal if your Club wants to be involved as many did for phase 1 – not only from this District but also from other Districts.
