eam Service News

I attended a GST meeting in Birmingham and the latest news for the Five Pillars of Service follows:

DIABETES - While a MD Officer has yet to be appointed, it was agreed that the GST Officers would be trained to complete Are You at Risk? assessments by Diabetes UK. This follows a successful training in 105EA. Once trained we will be able to train other Lions to carry out this task. Type 2 Diabetes is now a world-wide epidemic and one of the worrying problems is that so many (like myself) do not realise they are sufferers until a blood test is done. Untold damage could be happening and it is essential that anyone with the condition is found so that they can be treated.

VISION - The Lions Eye Health Programme (LEHP) will be relaunched with the emphasis being on Save our Sight. World Sight Day is on Thursday 11 October and as usual Clubs are encouraged to mark the day. The World Wide Week of Service in Sight takes place from Monday 8 October until Sunday 14 October. Sight or vision has been at the heart of Lions' service since Helen Keller asked us to be "Knights of the Blind" back in 1925.

During the week of service, and especially on World Sight Day, Clubs are asked to do something to help the blind or visually impaired, or to raise awareness of vision issues, within their community. Many Clubs collect used specs, so why not make 11 October 11 an extra special day for collecting them?

If there is a club or organisation which supports the blind in your community, why not do something special for them when they meet during October or help a blind person living in your area.

Make the community aware of one of the difficulties of being blind or having low vision by arranging a blindfolded walk for your Club and a local dignitary, such as the Mayor, to experience problems such as obstacles on pavements. Believe me, there are more than you realise!

To increase your knowledge of what happens to used specs, visit Chichester Lions at their workshop at Apuldram (PO20 7PE) between 10.00 am and 1.00 pm.

LCI has a list project ideas under the Act Now section on Vision. This can be accessed by going to LCI and selecting How we Serve and then Vision. If you just want to donate to Sight Projects then consider Sight Savers, Guide Dogs for the Blind or Living Paintings.

ENVIRONMENT - 1st VDG Lion Jarvis and I want to hold a Districtwide Litter Pick to coincide with World Earth Day on 22 April . We are also going to take this MD-wide. All the information needed to carry out this project will be published in October so you will have plenty of time to plan your event.

I will, as MD Environment Officer, be running a MD Environment Photographic Competition. This will be basically the same as last year although the photo size will be changed to 13 x 18 cms. Full details will be available soon on the MD and District websites.

HUNGER RELIEF - Districts 105E and 105EA are organising a **Feed** the 5000 on Saturday 22 September in Leicester. Further information is available at **lionssf5k.com**. 105A are also concerned about

children going hungry during the summer holidays when school meals are not available. It is too late for this year but I will be following this up for future holidays as to how Clubs can help.

CHILDHOOD CANCER - Work is still ongoing to set up a partnership with Brain Tumour Research. This will result in Clubs being able to help finance a new laboratory for research into brain tumours which is the biggest cancer killing children and young people under 40.

In the meantime, our DG'S Partner's Appeal is for Kids Cancer Charity which "helps children affected by cancer live life to the full".

Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

I begin with some figures. During the last Lionistic year to 30 June 2018 the Clubs in 105D donated £20,557 to Lions Clubs International Foundation. Thank you for continuing to support LCIF.

Many Clubs will have donated to the One Shot, One Life campaign to provide vaccinations for children against measles. I am pleased to say that the campaign has raised \$30 (£22.8) million which when doubled by our partners means a total of \$60 (£45.6) million, thus some 88 million children have received this life saving vaccine. I am pleased to say that the campaign will continue.

As I mentioned in my previous article LCIF is 50 years old and during that time \$1 billion has been awarded through 13,000+ grants which have focused on vision, youth, disaster relief and humanitarian programmes. The need continues around the world and LCIF is asking for donations to help our Japanese Lions, to help provide relief after the recent devastating flooding which happened while many Lions were returning home after the recent International Convention in Las Vegas.

Launched in Las Vegas was the Foundation's most ambitious fundraising challenge so far. To celebrate our organisation's first 100 years of service and to provide for the next 100 years, and beyond. Challenge 100 hopes, with the help of Lions members and Clubs to raise \$300 (£228) million over three years.

The Foundation will continue working in the areas it always has and will also support the Global Service Teams' areas of hunger, environment, sight, childhood cancer and diabetes. The need for the Foundation is still there in our world since 245 people a day still die from measles, there has been 15 per cent rise in natural disasters, 800 million people worldwide go to bed at night hungry, by 2025 at least half the world's population will be living in water-stressed areas, every two minutes a child is diagnosed with cancer, 253 million people are blind or visually impaired (this is set to rise). There is still much to do.

Earlier this year the Blackmore Vale Lions Club held their 31st charity fundraising Swimarathon at Clayesmore School Sports Centre, Iwerne Minster, Blandford. Over the 31 years the event has raised over £250,000.

charge for admission, programmes were sold in advance


from door to door in the July heat wave!


attend were high and to enable their attendance they approached Fareham

Lions for help.



As a Mum of three, grandmother to seven and having spent more than ten years working on the children's ward at Salisbury District Hospital, my chosen charity would inevitably involve children. It is ironic that the fifth pillar of service recently introduced by Lions Clubs International is Children with Cancer.

Kids Cancer Charity was established as the Christian Lewis Trust in 1989 and works alongside medical professionals and other support agencies to improve the quality of life for children affected by a cancer illness. From Play Therapy to Befriending to 'one to one' bereavement and pre-bereavement support for children/teenagers and their families. It also runs support groups.

Kids Cancer Charity is probably known for its Holiday Programme, working with partner organisations both in the UK and abroad enabling them to offer:

UK: Luxury static caravans on specially chosen sites situated in Wales.

Disneyland Paris: 3 day visit for a family with an ill child to include on-site Disney Accommodation and Theme Park passes.

Disney World Florida: A tailor-made package to include the possibility in the world renowned 'Give Kids The World Village, Theme Park passes and a stay at the charity's own luxury villa.

I hope that thanks to the generosity of my fellow Lions during DG Lion Ken's year, we will be able to make a big difference to the families and children in our District suffering with cancer.

The Editor has the last word ...


