
GIVE THEM A VOICE and LISTEN.

The Wokingham Lions Club is collecting foodstuffs for delivery to them before Christmas. The annual Christmas Collection at local supermarkets kicks off on Saturday 1 December for a week.

'We are hoping that shoppers will support our Christmas Collection by purchasing an extra item of shopping and donating it to the Wokingham Lions Club,' says Lion John Cleary, the Christmas Collection organizer. 'We are looking for canned soups/vegetables, canned fish/meat, biscuits, non -perishable food, mini Christmas puddings and other treats.'

Club members separate the food and assemble the items into parcels which are then delivered to private homes and care homes before Christmas.

Hook and Odiham Lions recently helped the Sunflower Café in Odiham following a very interesting talk by two of the members of the Mother's Union who run it.

The café was set up to help people living with dementia, their carers, families and friends to enjoy refreshments and activities once a week. They provide many games, have music sessions and with the help of the Hook and Odiham donation will be adding chair based exercise sessions.

And more news... How two 105D Clubs commemorated World Diabetes Day

The Windsor Lions were busy at Tesco in Dedworth supporting World Diabetes Day



promoted by Diabetes UK. The Club had a stall in the foyer of Tesco where the risks associated with diabetes were highlighted by distributing flyers and staging a competition. Lions Teresa

and Nick Jones headed up the event and, together with other Lions, found there was a lot of interest, due in part to the national publicity programme Diabetes UK have implemented.

To help illustrate the problems caused by too much sugar, a simple 'sugar' quiz was provided. Passers-by were asked to match various soft drinks to small bags of sugar. It surprised many that even some small bottles soft drinks contained more than 13 spoonfuls of sugar! The Lions had a great day and were very grateful to Tesco at Dedworth for their support.

Andrea Baganz-Pritchard, Diabetes UK's Regional Fundraiser, attended the event and was delighted to see so many members of the public talking about their own experiences of living with diabetes. She said: 'We are really grateful to the Windsor Lions for this event. The funds raised will help change lives for those with diabetes.' The Lions Club of Jersey joined forces with Diabetes Jersey, an independent Jersey charity, to commemorate World Diabetes Day by helping to generate publicity about Types 1 and 2 diabetes. In Jersey every day at least one more person contracts diabetes.

On World Diabetes Day itself, the joint effort had full page coverage in the local daily paper, a full hour's programme on BBC Radio Jersey, live local BBC and ITV television interviews, significant online coverage and free testing for Type 2 diabetes offered by the Channel Islands Cooperative Society. This event, held in two of the Coop's busiest supermarkets in Jersey, attracted several hundred Islanders to be tested and is being continued on a weekly basis until early December.

To generate further publicity, half a dozen Jersey Lions were tested under the eyes of the local media and the Lions also sponsored the printing of 3,500 copies of a special booklet, given out at the Coop, commemorating the life changing discovery of Drs Banting and Best.

Newbury Lions Club event is the best - it's official!





A poem that tells of living with Type 1 diabetes

- It's 38 years since unquenchable thirst and sudden weight loss admitted me to hospital where I met DIABETES face to face in that place where order, uniform and tests were the norm.
- Basically my body had lost its ability to metabolise sugars and starches into energy. I couldn't neutralise my body chemistry.

A chronic disease had hold of me with intention.

Had a virus caused this slip in function? I need to mention it's not because I ate too many sweets: that's not the cause of Type 1. No, for some other reason the previously plenteous beta cells in my pancreas had come undone. Treason.

I had to learn a number-crunching, glucosemunching, new way of living, a life-saving routine of food choosing, insulin using, injection giving.

And so began the jabbing of an orange to practice for the real thing when a hypodermic would pierce my skin plunge the reviving hormone in.

Back then the needles were longer, thicker, crueller. Back then urine checking was the biz, re-agent tablets to fizz and show you how out of range you were. Later, lancet loading, finger pricking, little blobs of blood would immediately determine what your sugar level was.

So, back to when it had begun to go wrong: insulin's depleted, it's injected. But which type? How much? How often? How will my body be affected? What to eat to balance the dose?

Learn to carbohydrate count, weigh each amount. Every meal's a multiplex of glycaemic index or a taste waste on a plate.

You've got to know your carb to insulin ratio, and which foods act quick, which digest slow.

As you juggle with meals and medication add the struggle of stress, the effect of illness, exercise and emotion to the equation. All have an impact, all react (consistently unpredictably).

Diabetes, Type 1, is misunderstood: the causes, complications, treatments and the food.

You think multiple injection is the very worst part? Think again, it's not that, it's the regimen: the daily grind of test, inject, eat, test, inject, eat on repeat, repeat, repeat, repeat... the pressure of trying to keep blood sugar levels in target range when so many factors cause it to change. You have to become the specialist, know what your GP doesn't know, and if a medic doesn't specialise you'll be surprised that you're aware of much more than they about the condition you have to balance every day.

And anyway, can this disease be so bad after all if Jelly Babies are its emergency fuel...

This poem was written by Jersey poet Juliette Hart who has lived with Type 1 diabetes for almost 40 years. The poem was written specially for World Diabetes Day and was broadcast live on BBC Radio Jersey during the hour-long programme devoted to generating diabetes awareness. Also taking part in the programme were the chairman of Diabetes Jersey (who has Type 2 diabetes), the parent of a six-year-old who has been diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes and the Jersey Lions' diabetes officer Lion Peter Tabb.
