I hope that you all had a marvellous Christmas and that you have taken it easy after your pre-Christmas fundraising with Santa and his crew. I applaud you all.

Over Christmas, I was privileged to have been a patient in Salisbury District Hospital and I mean privileged in every sense of the word. Let me explain. During my stay, I was in isolation, an en-suite room of good size and all the trappings of a modern hospital. However, the 'entertainment' was restricted to TV from 8.00 am until 12.00 noon (except



Christmas Day which went until 5.00 pm) unless I wanted to pay for the 'service'. Radio was free. I had three very good meals a day and visiting from 11.00 am until 8.00 pm. So I had a lot of thinking time, planning time and basically reviewing my future actions in my private, business and Lions lives.

The outstanding privilege was to be among the most dedicated team of professionals, who actually choose to work over these special periods, always positive, always busy (sometimes not getting a break over a 13 hour shift), always respectful and always putting the patients in their care first and foremost. I got to talk to them (as I do) and some drive 40 to 60-mile round trips to 'do the job', then have the **great** privilege of being **charged** to park their cars!!

Then I thought of the Lions who were out on Christmas Day feeding the lonely, the ageing and the homeless (indeed, I was booked to help out at Trowbridge), and I felt that great rush of pride that can only come from one who has the greatest respect for his fellow human beings and (that word again) the privilege of holding the position of YOUR District Governor.

As I have often told many of you, your Council of Governors are a VERY tight Team, and I heard from a couple the following:

- Crewe and Nantwich Lions inducted ten new Members to their new Branch Club (30 to 40 year olds);
- Birmingham Lions inducted nine new Members for one Club, and have a New Club chartering in March; and
- Guildford Lions have submitted an application to start a Leo Omega Club and already have 20 Charter Members.

These positive signs from around the UK can only improve our standing within our communities giving us more opportunities for SERVICE to those same communities.

We can do similar in 105D. We can make more use of social media. We can look at using our homes as a breeding ground (no room hire, no leaflets or flyers, no second-guessing numbers as all are invited. NO WASTE either in time or resources), an idea that I sent to every President and Secretary in the form of a presentation at the beginning of my year, and yet in my travels I find that very, very FEW Members know about it or have even seen it. It may not be the answer, but I KNOW it works (ask Hayling Island Lions where one member did a similar exercise with amazing results!!)

There will be a reasonably priced lunch after which we will have some SOCIAL time, a chance to chat, meet old and new friends, to enjoy each other's company and start celebrating 54 years of Service as a District to our communities that will culminate in March at our Weymouth Convention.

PLEASE email me as soon as possible whether you will be attending **or not** as we will need to book an appropriate sized venue and as this invitation is to the President and New Members, there is no need to take it to the Club meeting, so a reply can be forthcoming very early.



They always attended Zone Meetings and District Conventions. In February 2017, Allison and John were presented with Melvin Jones Fellowships. Unfortunately Allison died in April 2017 and Cosham Lions closed in June. Age and ill-health prevented John continuing as a Lion.

Members of the Wokingham Lions Club have been busy collecting, sorting and packing Christmas food parcels for the elderly and local families in need. "We have had one of our best years ever for donations," says Lion John Cleary, who organises the annual Christmas Can Can Collection. "Approximately 3,470 food items have been donated over two weekends this month. We would like to thank the people of Wokingham for their amazing generosity and our members, who donated their time to this annual project."

The Lions assembled 290 individual mixed food parcels (10 items per parcel). Added to these were 100 items that were too big for the bags – Christmas puddings and large boxes of biscuits. These were then collected and distributed to individuals and families on tight budgets. "The smiles and gratitude expressed by those who receive the parcels make it all worthwhile. This is what Christmas is all about," Lion Cleary said.

The Lions also delivered donated food to local care homes and day centres for the elderly, including 30 boxes of family-sized biscuits, 100 standard-size packs of biscuits, 20 large Christmas puddings, 340 cans of soup & assorted tinned food

In addition, six tins of dog food and 10 packets of cat food were delivered to the Diana Brimblecombe Animal Rescue Centre.

The Christmas Can Can Collection is a community service project run by the Wokingham Lions Club for more than 20 years. Recipients include the elderly living at home, parents with young families, day centres for the elderly, Wokingham Community Hospital, Anthony Toby Homes Trust, The Salvation Army and the Wokingham Foodbank.
