## **Global Services Team News**

**Diabetes:** I attended a Loddon Valley Lions Club meeting where Andrea Baganz-Pritchard, the Fund Raiser from Diabetes UK, was a speaker. She represents London and South Central England and is willing to help provide volunteers to help run Know Your Risk Sessions for Lions at events. She also said that Fleet Lions have been trained to carry out

these sessions. She reiterated that Diabetes UK no longer supports taking blood samples, partly because of hygiene concerns and the fact that blood tests only give a reading for that particular moment. Many things, including just eating, can give a false indication of a person's overall blood sugar levels. Andrea's email address is Andrea.Baganz-Pritchard@diabetes.org.uk.

**Environment:** The winning photos from 105D have been sent to MFHQ for judging by the District Governors. To date I have not received the results. The winners will be announced at our Convention. The standard of photos was very good and it was difficult to judge them.

The MD-wide Litter Pick is on course for April but 105E are now asking Districts and Clubs to work with the National Trust to see if we can work together on this as they are doing. I am investigating this and will be writing to you. Also, the *Daily Mail* is partnering with Keep Britain Tidy, to promote the Great British Spring Clean. This will take place between 22 March and 22 April. While this is only just in my preferred week for carrying out Litter Picks, this could be an opportunity for Clubs to get publicity and do some good for the community. You can sign up to the Daily Mail campaign by logging on to gbspringclean.org Both 105E and the Daily Mail are placing great emphasis on getting young people involved, so these could be good ways to get either Leos or the children's parents interested in Lions.

**Vision:** Following the GST meeting the project to carry out eye tests on children is gaining momentum. The minutes state "the response to the vision screening suggestion had been greater than anticipated, with educationalists, schools and sight professionals confirming the need for Sight to be checked in children up to 7 years especially - the key time for intellectual development - to identify deficiencies." As a result of this, "An Education programme to inform about the project and its implementation is to be developed. Central control required, trained individuals to be in place with a team leading at the Multiple District level. Detail needs to be checked and put in place. We should obtain support from LCIF by way of grant:minimum grant is £10,000 in excess of camera cost." The cost of the cameras is £6,500 plus VAT (£7,800) but the supplier advises they will offer discounts on multiple orders.

I await further information as to how we can proceed with this project.

#### Childhood Cancers: Please remember that Lion Jean's charity is Kids' Cancer Charity and support it.

**Brain Tumour Research:** A foundation has now been set up to raise £1 million over the next four years, to set up a new laboratory in this country to help with research into this devastating disease. It not only affects children directly but also affects them when parents or grandparents are diagnosed with a tumour. The fund raising will be led by Fran Stary who will be working with individuals, Clubs and Districts to achieve this target which is the largest appeal ever run by the MD.

# LIONS READY FOR ANY OTHER BEAST FROM THE EAST

Fleet Lions have been busy distributing 300 snow shovels to various organisations in time for any winter storms.

The second-hand shovels were obtained from Heathrow Airport's 'Winter Division' who had just received replacement units. Rather than these shovels being scrapped, Heathrow

Maintenance were more than happy that they could be of use in the community.

The entire shipment, collected from Heathrow by Fleet Lions, was distributed within a week to local schools, church groups, medical outlets including Phyliss Tuckwell, the Lions Community Store, and to various retail outlets. Lion Paul Hayes, who co-ordinated with local schools, said that he could have found homes for another hundred shovels. "At least nine schools will have no problem this winter in clearing their pathways when the snow comes."

## There's a plaice for us...

A chilly start faced the hardy Meon Valley Lions on Weston Shore on Sunday 20 January as they laid out their stall for the 44<sup>th</sup> annual Ford Charity Fishing Festival. Well before the official 7.00 am registration time, more than 80 stalwart fishermen had joined the queue to pay their entrance fees and draw their competition stations, spreading from Rolling Mill to Beach Lane, Netley.

Meon Valley Lions have provided support for this fishing festival since the 1990s. This year the proceeds (estimated to be £1,000) of this long-standing fund-raiser will be going to Rose Road Association in Southampton. This amazing place provides vital services for over 300 children and young people with severe physical disabilities, learning difficulties and/or autism, from across Hampshire. They offer overnight short breaks, a community outreach service, after-school and holiday activity schemes, Saturday clubs and advice and support to families. All this costs money which comes entirely from donations, so it's great to be able to financially support their efforts.

Despite flat-calm conditions, competition was keen and produced some good catches. The first-place prize of £400 went to Dave Lane with a 1.9 lb. flounder. Dave also won the pool for the heaviest fish (£122) and heaviest bag in the red zone (£61) – not a bad return for a morning's fishing! Second place and a prize of £200 went to Paul Barclay with a catch of 1lb. 1.5 oz. Pool winner (£61), with the heaviest bag in white zone was Chi Cheung with a 6.5 oz. catch. See you all again next year!

## It's 'Boom Boom' from the pantomime cast to keep the heart of Windsor beating...

The cast from the acclaimed Royal Windsor Theatre Pantomime *Dick Whittington* - including favourite Basil Brush and *The Chase*'s Anne Hegerty—proudly showed off the potentially life-saving defibrillator installed recently on the Theatre Royal's premises. The defibrillator is supplied by the Windsor Community Defibrillator



Partnership (WCDP) whose objective is to raise funds for these devices. This particular defibrillator is one of nine now dotted around Windsor town centre. The group comprises representatives from Windsor and Eton Rotary Club. Windsor Street Angels, Thames Valley Police, Windsor Town Centre Management and Windsor Lions.

Defibrillators are life-saving devices which, if used within three minutes of a cardiac arrest, give a 79 per cent chance of survival. Without one, after ten minutes, the chances of survival are minimal. This highlights just how vitally important the Partnership's work is to the local community.

Rotarian Chris Davies, a member of WCDP, enthused: 'The great thing about these devices is that anyone can use them - no training is required and no harm can be done by using them. All you have to do is dial 999 and the emergency services will advise you where the nearest defib-

rillator is and give all the necessary guidance.'

The WCDP has taken great strides towards their target of ten publicly accessible defibrillators around the town centre and provides the essential cardiac pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training alongside the defibrillator project.
