Find a site for planting e.g. a copse or hedgerow. Your local authority or parks department should be able to help. Obtain permission from the legal owner of the site. Knowing your six figure grid reference will help, here is a link <u>https://gridreferencefinder.com/</u>.

CAMPAIGN | 100



By now many of you will have caught up with the information regarding Cyclone Idai. The response made by LCIF was to issue two grants of \$10,000 and one of \$50,000. I am sure that more will be issued when the need arises. Some Clubs have undertaken collections and others have donated to the LCIF Disaster fund. LCIF was also able to respond to the terrible flooding which occurred in the USA. In Nebraska alone livestock and crop losses are expected to reach \$1 billion. In the aftermath of the flooding, LCIF issued five grants of \$10,000 and a further Major Catastrophe grant of \$50,000. LCIF can do this because of the generosity of Clubs who donate. This supports our worldwide commitment to help those in need whoever and wherever they are. This is our Foundation, giving help where it is needed and being organised by Lions on the ground.

Those of you who were at 105D Convention will know that I gave a short presentation on Campaign 100. The campaign is a capital fundraiser launched at the International Convention in Las Vegas. The aim is to raise \$300 million over three years. There will be some members who remember Campaigns Sightfirst I and II raising funds for sight projects. Campaign 100 hopes to enable Lions worldwide to undertake major service projects. Ideally, they would like members to pledge to give \$100 a year for the next three years, or Clubs to put on fundraising events for the Campaign.

Thank you to those who have supported the recent appeal to help those who need it most.

On a cold, but dry afternoon in early March, we cleared the old container. It was when the new storage arrived the fun started— making the new

container fit into a gap slightly narrower than itself!

However with some deft juggling with a jack and some concrete blocks (quite a task with such a large box-like structure), the new container was lowered into position with just a small gap on each side. Now it was just a case of

The problem with the sleigh was that the new container was higher off the ground than the old one, but after several tries it was manhandled into its new home.

Luckily the weather, although cold, had remained dry and all our equipment is now safely stored in its "new" home which is watertight and animal free.

Our grateful thanks to the SOS driver who did an amazing job, the farmer who allows us to have the site and to Hook Parish Council for their grant.

Life Saver!

On Wednesday 10 April more than 80 people attended two WCDP CPR/Defibrillator Training Sessions in Windsor's Guildhall.

The 90 minute sessions are designed to inform members of the public how to respond should they finfd someone unconscious. The training covered possible symptoms, contacting the emergency services, applying cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and how to use a defibrillator.

Windsor Community Defibrillator Partnership (WCDP) provides CPR/Defibrillator Training Sessions

The session was led by State Registered Paramedic Dick Tracey who, following his early retirement as a senior manager at South Central Ambulance Service, has dedicated his time to training community groups on how safely to use defibrillators.

The partnership was formed in 2016 with Windsor Lions as a member. Their aim is to purchase and maintain strategically life-saving equipment in the town and have so far installed 11 defibrillators.





I trust readers will forgive the domination of the front page by a Channel Islands news story. In 1980 the Lions Club of Guernsey lent their support (and significant funding) to establish a Channel Islands Air Search. Such was the value of the service that the proceeds of several Jersey Lions' Swimarathons also supported the service which has played a vital role in saving lives at sea. Both Islands were justly proud that the aircraft was christened Lions' Pride.

Sadly when the first Lions' Pride crashed (fortunately without any loss of life) the one piece of kit totally destroyed was a £50,000 infrared camera recently funded by the Jersey Lions!

It's taken nearly five years for the new Lions' Pride to take flight and we are mightily proud of that logo on its tail.
