# Lion Heidi's climbing Kilimanjaro!



Hi, I'm Lion Heidi Nathan from the Helen Keller Internet Lions Club.

Lam the UK representative in a group of ladies - all Lions from ten countries - the UK, Italy, Russia, Denmark, Nepal, United Arab Emirates, Romania, Switzerland, Poland and Kenya.

In August this year we will be meeting in Tanzania to climb Kilimanjaro, the highest mountain in Africa with its summit

5,895 metres above sea level, making it the fourth highest mountain in the world. It will take us eight days to complete the climb and descent.

Altitude sickness will be our main enemy, this can strike anyone regardless of fitness level and at the summit the temperature can falls to -29 degrees C! Thermals are definitely called for! In preparation for this amazing adventure I'm attending a daily pilates class, swimming, hiking, cycling (when the weather's good) and weight training at the gym. It's not doing much for my Weight Watchers as I have had to increase my carb intake but the extra weight might be good on the mountain if I don't like the food!

Our goal is to raise \$10,000 each to reach \$100,000 for the Amrita Centre Kenya (although this is a group project so moneys will go towards the collective goal). The project is schooling for orphans. The Amrita centre is home to 250 to 300 orphans at any time. We are planning to build four classrooms to give these children an opportunity for an education to enable them to get a job and to break the cycle of poverty. Each of us has an individual target to reach. My costs for flights, accommodation, mountain guides and equipment have been met by me personally so all funds so far have been towards my target as I am determined to get there!!

The project will by managed via LCIF, PID Lion Manoj Shah who is in Kenya and the Phoenix Club of Nairobi who will be overseeing this project so the moneys will not just be given to the centre. Lions will be managing this project from start to finish.

I'm not particularly fit, have just hit 50 and think I must be going mad to attempt this. However, I have a choice. These children do not have a choice. They are orphans and need all the help that we can give them to give them a better life. Help me to help these children towards a brighter future.



# WOKINGHAM LIONS DONATE £500 TO DAISY'S DREAM AND TO INVOLVE COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Wokingham Lions Club has donated £500 to each of two local charities, Daisy's Dream and Involve Community Services. Cheques were presented to representatives of the charities by Lion Debbie Slay, Wokingham Lions Club president.

Accepting the donation, Ellen Ludlow, fundraiser, Daisy's Dream, said: "We are a small local charity, based in Twyford. Started 22 years ago, Daisy's Dream gives support to children and families in Berkshire who have been bereaved. Advice and support are provided to more than 700 children each year. This £500 will support a family for one year."

Philip Cook, general manager, Involve Community Services, said: "We are a unique charity, now in our 40<sup>th</sup> year. We support other local charities and community groups. This £500 will be used for our Community Navigation Scheme, which helps people navigate to find help and support for a variety of issues, such as self-care, social care, housing, anxiety and mental health. People can access the service through a referral from a GP, social worker, family member or a self-referral."



The Windsor Lions sponsored the RDA (Riding for the Disabled Association) regional groups who had entered the Fancy Dress Competition at the Royal Windsor Horse Show on Thursday 9 May. More than £1,000 was distributed to six different groups from all over Berkshire and adjoining counties in both the Riding and Carriage Driving categories. The teams had a lot of fun and all were exquisitely dressed, including the horses, and extremely colourful as the fancy-dress theme of the day was 'countries'. Eventual winners of the highly prized Lions Club of Windsor Cup were Park Lane RDA representing Wales.

#### NEW MILTON LIONS STAGE PSA TESTING EVENT

The Lions Club of New Milton, with Prostate Cancer Support Organisation (PCaSO), staged their first ever prostate cancer awareness event in March 2019. The event, held at the local Community Centre, was extremely well attended with some 300 men tested. Testing involved taking blood samples to measure the level of PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) oresent.

Despite around 12,000 men dying every year from prostate cancer, currently there is no national screening programme. New Milton Lions therefore decided to hold an event of their own in an effort to raise awareness among men in the local community and to help those found to be affected to combat the disease.

The PSA test is not, in itself, a test to diagnose cancer but it is currently the best method of identifying an increased risk of contracting the condition.

Having taken advice from other Lions Clubs who had held such events, the New Milton Lions' role was to identify, hire and pay for a suitable venue, publicise the event, provide a small number of people to deal with routine administration on the day, including managing people flow, and provide refreshments for those attending.

All men tested were expected to receive their results within seven to 10 working days of the event. Within the limitations of the PSA test, the Club believes that it provided a worthwhile service and enabled 34 men to take steps to tackle a potential threat - a real reward for the Club's efforts.

#### Ryde helps Haylands Farm

The Lions Club of Ryde recently visited Haylands Farm to view their latest project, an old building being transformed into purpose-built flats to accommodate six residents with special needs.

Ryde Lions have a long standing association with Haylands Farm having helped on numerous projects n the past.

The money came from a well attended and successful Fashion Show held in the Crosfield Hall, Romsey. The funds have been used to purchase Makaton software for the school. This software will teach pupils how to use the symbol and signing language which can benefit those who find it difficult to communicate through speech. In addition to the software the Lions also purchased wind chimes, flower mirrors and road signs for the youngsters to enjoy. Lion Andrew Trowbridge, Romsey and Waterside Lions' president, said it was a pleasure to help the school and praised the dedication of the staff and the enthusiasm of the children.
